Sec. 4 .- Any person violating or failing to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be liable to a fine of not to exceed ninety-nine dollars, or imprisonment not to exceed thirty days, or both. Any person failing to remove any of the obstructions named in this Ordinance within the time specified therein, shall be liable to further fine of five dollars for each and every day that such obstruction so remains.

Sec. 5 .- All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances relating to signs and awnings in conflict with this Ordinance are her. by repealed. Passed May 21st, 1878.
