FRENCH AEROPLANE MEETS WITH ACCIDENT

Constantinople, Dec. 12.—M. Bleriot, the French aeroplaneist, whose flight across the English channel was one of the most remarkable achievements of the year, and who has had more narrow escapes from death than any other aviator, met with another serious accident here today.

He was giving an exhibition in the presence of an immense crowd when his aeroplane collided with a house. The force of the impact turned the machine completely over, and Bleriot fell to the ground. He was injured on the left side and it is feared, internally hurt. His machine was wrecked.

Bleriot, who was using an aeroplane of the cross-channel type, did not wish to report the accident, but he had gathered to watch his exhibition, although a strong wind was blowing. No sooner had he ascended than he was carried away by the wind a mile and a half. He endeavored to tack and return, but was unable to rise above the roofs of the houses. His machine was driven against a wall and overturned, falling 25 feet.
