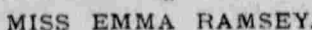


## China Satisfied With Assurances.

*Not Greatly Concerned by Russia's Alleged Designs on Manchuria--Relies Upon Explanations Given the United States Through Ambassador McCormick--Has Been No Re-occupation of New Chwang by Russians.*

**NEW CHWANG NOT RE-OCCUPIED**

London, May 11.—The under foreign secretary, Lord Cranborne, announced in the house of commons today that the British consul at New Chwang reported that there had been no re-occupation of the town by the Japanese. Friendly communications on the subject, Lord Cranborne added, had been addressed to the Russian government during the last few days of the war. The United States and Great Britain independently and the Russian government in reply had intimated that it would adhere to its engagements to evacuate Manchuria. The Japanese evacuation was temporarily delayed, but Russia had also explained that she had no intention of adopting any measures to prevent the evacuation. It was not possible to obstruct foreign commerce or the use of the ports. Under the circumstances the British government saw no sufficient cause for the asserted intervention between the United States, Japan and Great Britain, with the object as suggested by his questioner, Joseph W. Aldrich, of a formal act defining the agreement with Russia. The under secretary closed his assurances.
