NORTHERN TRIP

Parts. July 12.-The official program of Fresident Fallerlee' northern trip has been completed as follows : The president will sail from Dunkirk, July 18, on board the French baitleship Verite. escorted by a squadron consist-ing of the armored cruiser Dupetite. Theoras and three destroyers, for Co-penhagen, where he will arrive on July 20. An official reception will be tender-ed the president on handing at Copen-hagen, and he will be escorted to the Amalleborg palace, where in the even-ing a gala court dinner will be given in his honor, followed by a ball at the yacht club in honor of the French naval officers. On July 21, Mr. Fallieres will take lunch with the king and queen of Den-mark at the French legation, and in the evening will attend a dinner and court concert.

mark at the French legation, and in the evening will attend a dinner and court concert. On July 22 the president will visit the museums at Copenhagen and take lunch-eon at the Chateau Fredericksburg. On July 24 President Fallieres will ar-rive at Stockholm, Sweden, where he will be given an official reception, and in the evening a gala court dinner. On July 35, after an excursion to Gripps-hom, a dinner will be given at the French legation to the king and queen of Sweden. There will be a court lunch-eon July 26. On the following day the French president will arrive at Reval to exchange visits with Emperor Nicholas of Russia. The president will dine on board the Russian royal yacht Stand-ard. On July 26 the emperor will re-turn President Failieres' visit and dine on board the Verite. Only July 31 the French president will arrive at Chris-tiana, Norway, where he will attend a spice acut dinner. A luncheon will be given at the French legation in honor of the king and queen of Norway on Aug, j, which will be followed in the evening by a reception given by the French col-ony. An excursion will be made to Vox-enkolle on Aug. 2 and on the same day at 4 p. m. the president will leave Nor-way for France.

POWERS OF GOVERNMENT.

Are Co-ordinate-President's for Good or Evil Often Overestimated-Presidency Highest Position.

New York, July 13 .- William J. Bryan has written an article entitled "My Conception of the Presidency," for the July 18, issued by Collier's Weckely. "The president's power for good on for harm is often overestimated. This government is a government of checks and balances; power is distributed among different departments and each of them works in co-operation with others. In the making of laws, for in-stance, the president joins with the senate and house is a may recommend, but he is powerless to legislate, except as a majority of the senate and the house concur with him. The senate and the house are also independent of each other, each having a veto over the over both except that the senate and house can, by a two-thirds vote, over-ride the president set. The influence of the president over legislation is, therefore, limited; he shares responsi-bility with a large number of the peo-ple's representatives. "Even in the enforcement of law he is hedged about by restrictions. He acts through an attorney general whose appointment must be approved by the senate, and offenders against the by the senate, and offenders against the law must be prosecuted in the courts, so that here again the responsibility is divided. In the making of important appointments, too, he must consult the senate and is, of necessity, compelled to exercise care and discretion. The most important requisite in a presi-dent, as in other officials, is that sym-pathy shall be with the whole people, rather than with any fraction of the population. He is constantly called up-on to act in the capacity of a judge-deciding between the importunities of those who seek favors and the rights and interests of the public. Unless his sympathies are right, the few are sure to have one advantage over the many, for the masses have no one to present their claims. They act only at elec-tions; and must trust to their represen-tatives to protect them from all their foes. must be prosecuted in the court.

WHAT PRESIDENT NEEDS.

"Second, the president must have a knowledge of public questions and the ability to discern between the true and the false; he must be able to analyze the conditions and to detect the sophis-tries that are always employed by those who seek unfair advantages.

"Hoss who seek untail advantages. "He must possess the moral courage to stand against the influences that are brought to bear in favor of special in-terests. In fact, the quality of moral courage is as essential in a public official as either right sympathies or a trained mind. "A president must have courselors

trained mind. "A president must have counselors, and, to make wise use of counselors, he must be open to conviction. The president is committed by his plat-form to certain policies, and the plat-form is binding: he is also committed to certain principles of government, and these he is in duty bound to ap-ply in all matters that come before him.

PARKER WILL TAKE THE STUMP FOR BRYAN

Helena, Mont., July 13 .- Judge Alton B. Parker, who arrived here tonight announces that he will take the stump for William J. Bryan. He predicts that New York state will be carried by the nominee of the Denver convention. In an interview with the Associated

Press, Judge Parker stated that he intended to offer his services to the Democratic national comittee as a campaign speaker and would devote all the time he could to making speeches.

His Course is Clear and He Will Do What is Demanded of Him in Interests of Labor.

Fairview, Lincoln, Neb., July 13.-Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, and inferentially head of 3,000,000 voters of or

ganized labor affiliated with the federation, will support William Jennings Bryan in the coming presidential campaign. In political circles here today this announcyment overshadows all others, even the arrival of John W. Kern, the vice presidential nominee. Mr. Gompers' support was promised to the tleket, but he specifically denied any present intention of taking the stump in the coming campaign. Reports gained currency that the labor leader would speak from the platform, but he made no such announcement. As he left Fairview, after a 15 minutes' interview with Mr. Bryan, his manner was enthusiastic and his promises sat' isfactory to Mr. Bryan. At present it is believed there will be no need for Mr. Gompers' services in an oratorical sense. thers, even the arrival of John W

Mr. Gompers does not expect to b Mr. Gompers does not expect to be called upon to speak publicly in the campaign. The Republican convention, he asserts, ignored the demands of labor; the Democrats acknowledged them in their platform. His course is clear; he will do what is demanded of him in the interests of labor best ex-pressed in the platform adopted at Den-ver. As the situation is at present ver. DYNAMITER CONFESSES TO **BLOWING UP A RESIDENCE**

San Francisco, July 14.—John Claudia-nes, a Greek, 22 years of age, has made a confession to Dist. Atty. Langdon, that he is the man who dynamited the residence of James L. Gallagher in Oak-land, and afterward wreeked by dyna-mite two houses owned by Gallagher in Oakland which were unoccupied. Clau-dianes had been arrested by detectives in the employ of the district attorney. Gallagher is a former supervisor of San Francisco.

The information regarding the arrest, which was made on last Safurday night, has been withheld because the district attorney hoped to be able to apprehend Peter Claudianes, an older brother of the man arrested, who is believed by the attorney to be the man who inspired the younger brother to do the deed. It is asserted by the district attorney that in a letter which John wrote to Peter on July 2, which has fallen into the dis-trict attorney's hands, John convicted Peter of being the man who planned the dynamiting, and that he accuses his brother of receiving \$1,000 for the job and then refusing to divide. Although John Chaudianes has confess-ed to heing the actual perpetrator or un-crime he refuses absolutely to dividing the names of the performs who he claims paid his brother \$1,000 for committing the crime.

INDICTED FOR CONSPIRACY.

Portland. Or., July 14.—Henry G. Cook has been arersted at Baker City, Or., on an indictment returned by a federal jury of New York state charging conspiracy to defraud the government of public lands located in this state.

government of public lands located in this state. Cook is the official head of the Ore-gon Ranching and Timber company and the Southwest Texas Development company with headquarters in New York City. He is charged with or-ganizing a fraudulent scheme for ac-quiring several thousand acres of valu-able timber lands in eastern Oregon. A deputy United States marshal has gone to Baker City to bring Cook to Port-land to await further instructions from the east.
