# REV. EDDY'S VIEWS.

# Says Mistake Was Made in Clothing Jesus in Habiliments of Deity,

Rev. Frank Fay Eddy of the Unitarian church preached yesterday, on views of Christ, in which he said: "A mistake was made in clothing Jesus, the prophet of Judea, in the habiliments of deity. It is evident we must make some reconstruction of our religious conceptions. Indeed, it is apparent enough that many of us have involuntarily about completed the destruction of the whole theological system which was formulated about this symbolic and wholly unreal Christ. Let it be admitted that it is a dangerous and significant thing to cast out of one's life the symbols of a great relione's life the symbols of a great reli-gion. A modern school of apologetics has arisen to attempt the defense of the Christology of the church on the grounds of the usefulness of the sym-bols. They say that the old thought of Christ was a misjudgment, but that Christ stands the test of time as an in-carnation of God in man. Then they give us chapter after chapter of thap-sody and apostrophe about this Christ who is neither God nor man, but a kind of mystical combination of both. They of mystical combination of both. They give us a formless and featureless Christ and consequently a meaningless

Such is the uscless work of such "Such is the uscless work of such writers as Fairbairn and Gordon Wat-ion and Lyman Abbott. They are in love with the beautiful symbolism which clusters around the Christ of dogma. But this symbolism has no use for humanity once the reality of this kind of a Christ is questioned. It be-comes but a whited sepulchre filled with noisome sights and foul air with noisome sights and foul air.

Political parties are absolutely neces-sary. It is not necessary for me to em-phasize which party you should join. Both parties are good, both are honest; but you should join one of them. I have no sympathy for the wave of pessimism which has swept over the country dur-ing the past few years. There never has been a time in the history of our country where there was less dishonesty, graft and corruption among the men who administered our government than today.
