Tuntsten is not newly-discovered metal, but the discovery of a myriad of uses for it have increased its value and made it as much sought for as

Tungsten is to refined steel almost as essential as copper is to electricity. In this connection it occupies the peculiar position of both an economic and a pre-

Metallic tungsten has a specific grav-ity of 18.7 and defies combustion. Used in steel, it destroys the process of crys-tallization. For hardening tools, guns and armor plate beyond any possibility of ordinary clevage, it has become an Recently scientists declare that tang-sten will supplant the tiny plathum

sten will supplant the tiny plathnum thread in the incandescent globe, giv-ing forth three times the light. Tungsten occurs in wolfranite, hub-nernite and sheellte. The 98 per cent metal is worth \$1.25 a pound. Within the past few months so many new uses have been found for tungsten that the demand passes all prospect for supply. Like tin, the deposits of tungsten are few and the quantity where it is found extremely small. THIRTEEN SHIPPERS.

Pledge Themselves to Sack and Ship High Grade to Salt Lake.

Wonder, Nev., April 26.—At a meet-ling of mile operators and mine super-intendents today reports were read as to the amount of high grade mined to date and of the improved conditions of the wagon roads to Fallon, on the Southern Fuclies. A compact was en-tered into, by the terms of which ore shipments to the smelters at Salt __axo must be made in car lots by all par-ties to the agreement without delay. Thirteen mining companies pledged themselves to at once such and ship all the high grade on theb dumps. Ship-ments will be made by the following companies. In the order named. Lack Pot. Spider Wasp. Vuiture, Nevada Wonder, Ruby, Rich Gulch, View, Coloradoe, Christmas, June, Black Rock and Capital. Freight and treatment charges will be approxi-mately \$35 per ton. The average value of the ore ready for shipment by the 13 companies is conservatively estimate-d at \$200 per ion. The purpose of this concerted move is to demonstrate to the mining world the real extent of the rich ore discoveries here. No other precious metal mining camp in the state, whatever its age, boasts of 12 shipping mines, and Wonder is not yet a year old.
