He had a passion for doing daring things, While a student at Oxford somebody dared him to ride down a long flight of stone steps leading from one of the halls on his bicycle. Immediately he brought his machine to college, which in itself constituted a serious breach of the rules, and conveyed it to the top of the stairs. Then he started on a ter-rific descent at lighting speed to the bottom. He escaped fortunately with a few bad bruises, but the bicycle was sunashed beyoud all hope of repair.
