## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**Ogden's New Co-op.**—Ogden is to have a new Co-op. building. Its location is to be on the site of the old Tithing Office, cross-cornered from Dooley and Co's Bank. It will be made of pressed brick, with stone corners, sills, etc., and will cost at least \$50,000. Its frontage on Main Street will be 115 feet and on Fourth Street 100 feet. Work on the foundation will commence in a few days. So we learn from the Junction.

**"Juvenile Instructor."**—The subscribers of the *Juvenile Instructor*, who have not received the last two numbers of that magazine, will please attribute the delay to the non-arrival of paper ordered from the States in December. The type is up for both numbers, and all that is needed is the paper. The publishers regret the delay, and trusting that their patrons will bear with them for a time, promise the back numbers at an early day.

**Provo's Convention.**—By courtesy of a gentleman from Provo we learn that the result of the municipal convention held there, yesterday, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the various city offices of that place, was as follows: For Mayor, A. O. Smoot; Aldermen: 1st ward, W. H. Dusenberry; 2nd, I. Bullock; 3d, M. Tanner; 4th, J. E. Booth. Councilors: 1st ward, T. Allman and J. P. R. Johnson; 2nd, J. N. Lovelless and A. Jones; 3rd, W. D. Roberts and Frank Scott; 4th, A. D. Holdway and John Meldrum. Recorder, J. B. Keeler; Treasurer, J. E. Daniels; Marshal, J. W. Turner; Assessor and Collector, Geo. M. Brown.

**The Church Cattle Case.**—The case of the People vs. Henry Keyser and others, charged with stealing Church cattle last fall, came up yesterday in the District Court. The defendant Keyser was allowed to withdraw his former plea of not guilty, and file a demurrer to the indictment made in the case, the chief grounds for which were that the Church was not a corporate body, and also that the stolen property was not sufficiently specified and described. The demurrer was argued yesterday afternoon, submitted and taken under advisement, and this morning was overruled by the Court. The next step will probably be a renewal of the plea of not guilty, and the case will go to trial.

**Shooting in Ogden.**—The Junction informs us that on Sunday afternoon, a man named William Kerns was shot in the Keeney House, Ogden, by one John Mansfield, from Park City. Sheriff Brown was after Mansfield and another man named Coyle, for stealing, and Kerns was in company with the Sheriff. Mansfield, on being accused of purloining an ulster, promised to restore it, and had been permitted to go after it. While Kerns was standing talking with the clerk in the hotel, Mansfield entered the door and began shooting at Kerns, two of the shots taking effect. Mansfield and Coyle are both under arrest, and the wounded man is now pretty comfortable.

People, etc., vs. James Moray, murder; defendant files bond in sum of \$1,000; approved by the court and ordered that defendant be released.

Ha-vay Rickard et al. vs. R. C. Chambers et al.; dismissed at plaintiff's cost. Elizabeth Townsend vs. George C. Bates, et al.; on plaintiff's motion dismissed.

Chas. W. Bennett vs. Equitable T. and M. Co.; on plaintiff's motion dismissed.

Adjourned till Wednesday.

**The Municipal Convention.**—The People's municipal convention was held last evening in the City Hall, at 7 o'clock. Hon. H. S. Eldredge was elected chairman pro tem, and H. J. Grant, secretary pro tem. A committee on credentials was appointed consisting of T. V. Williams, James P. Freeze and Charles Crow, and retired to examine the credentials of the delegates to the convention. While they were out short speeches were made by Col. R. Smith, and Messrs. J. West and A. J. Pendleton. The committee on credentials returned and submitted their report, which was received. The roll was called and a permanent organization effected, with A. J. Grant, Secretary; B. Y. Hampton, Sergeant-at-arms; S. H. B. Smith, door-keeper, and Jos. E. Taylor, Chaplain. On motion a committee of ten, two members from each municipal ward, was appointed to make a selection of names for the action of the Convention. Following are the names of the committee: Joseph McMurrin and Wm. Hart, 1st precinct; Angus M. Cannon and Wm. McLachlan, 2nd precinct; Alfred Solomon and James W. Phippen, 3rd precinct; Robert Patrick and Henry Puzey, 4th precinct; James P. Freeze and Miner G. Atwood, 5th precinct. Mr. A. M. Cannon was appointed chairman of this committee, which then withdrew to make the selections. Speeches were made during their absence, by Messrs. Miner, Pendleton, Isom, Williams, Brinley, Smith, West, Schoenfeldt and Crow. The committee then returned and submitted the following report. On the selection of the name of Mr. O. F. Whitney, as nominee for Councilor from the Fourth Precinct, Mr. A. Isom, delegate from that precinct, said he could not consistently vote for Mr. Whitney, as he was not a resident of the dry bench, and his instructions were to vote for a man who lived on the bench. This was replied to by Mr. R. Patrick, also a delegate from that precinct, who sustained the nomination heartily, and was assured that Mr. Whitney, though not a resident of the bench, was a friend to the people who lived there, and would faithfully repre-

sent their interests in the City Council. The vote on the nomination was then taken, Mr. Isom alone dissenting. The People's Central Committee were sustained for a further term of two years, and the Convention adjourned *sine die*.

**Jottings by the Way.**—From a letter written by our traveling agent, Brother William Bramall, at Fountain Green, Sanpete County, on the 1st inst., we learn that the good people of the south are experiencing some of the coldest weather they have ever known in that locality. Wells over 12 feet deep to the surface of the water, had frozen over. Diphtheria was prevalent in Sanpete.

The same phenomenon in frozen wells is being experienced in Utah County.

**"Junction" Items.**—Mr. Thomas Heninger, of this city, was arrested yesterday on an indictment for bigamy, found by the grand jury of the Third District Court, in November last. Mr. H. has been aware of the finding of the indictment ever since it was presented, and so is not taken by surprise. He goes to Salt Lake City this morning with his attorneys, Messrs. Richards and Williams.

At nine o'clock on Monday evening there passed away from this earth one of its sweetest creatures—Mrs. Martha Walker, wife of Joseph Walker, and daughter of Bishop Christopher Layton, of Kaysville. The departed was only 19 years of age, yet she had from childhood possessed the affections and admiration of a host of friends.

**Another Bubble Burst.**—The old Potter murder case has, at last, been disposed of. After being harassed for years, the defendants Jacob Hoffman, Jackson Redden, William Smith, Alma Eldredge, James Livingston and Joseph Brim, charged with killing the horse thief, Ike Potter, have been set at liberty. On the case coming up in court, this morning, for the "forty eleventh" time, it was ascertained that the plaintiffs had no testimony to offer; whereupon, the jury consulted and returned a verdict of not guilty, and the defendants were discharged.

**The Woman's Bill Rejected.**—H. F. 51, to amend section 43 of the Compiled Laws, so as to give women the right to hold certain clerical and ecclesiastical offices, was discussed at some length in the House yesterday afternoon. A motion to strike out the enacting clause was then put and carried, and the bill was rejected. H. F. 51, the bill to remove the political disabilities of the women of Utah, still remains upon the table, subject to a call for its further disposition at the hands of the House. Those who spoke in favor of the passage of H. F. 51 were Messrs. Penrose, Jacques and Lyman; those opposed, Messrs. Grover, Fisher and Smith. The discussion was extended and very interesting. The vote on the rejection of the bill was not full on either side.

Brigham City—Been snowing all morning, north wind now.

Paris—Moderating and snowing a little, about 18 inches snow on ground.
