The New Pension Law. WASHINGTON, 2.—The act passed June 18th, amendatory of the pen-sion law, provides that all person who are now entitled to pensions under the existing laws, and who have lost au arm at or above the el-

persons as shall be entitled to pen-sions under this act. This law by its terms was to take effect from and after June 4th, 1873. General Baker, commissioner of pensions, to-day announces that the persons embraced within the provisions of embraced within the provisions of this act can secure the benefits of the same without a formal applica-tion, and without the intervention

tion, and without the intervention of an attorney. A power of attor-ney will not be recognized in an application for the increase of pen-sion provided by this act. A letter of the pensioner addressed to the commissioner of pensions, enclos-ing his pension certificate, and giv-ing his post office address, will be a sufficient presentation of his claim.
