AN ENTERPRISING CONCERN.

A visit to the Ensign Knitting Co. at 36 Richard St. will convince the most skeptic person that the "Home Industry" spirit is certainly making rapid progress for the Ensign.

This company, incorporated Feb. 25, of the present year, with \$50,000.00 capital, \$25,000.00 of which was soon all paid up.

Dr. Fred Stauffer is president, Samuel G. Spencer, vice president, and manager; Frank R. Snow, secretary, and James W. Saville, treasurer. The directors are Dr. Fred Stauffer, Samuel G. Spencer, Frank R. Snow, George Romney, N. W. Clayton, Richard W. Young and Dr. Samuel H. Allen.

Mr. Spencer, the manager, visited some of the most up-to-date knitting machine factories, both in the east and in Europe, with the result that he was able to select the very latest improved machinery in the world and the result has been that since installing the plant about April 1st the business has come their way, so rapidly after once getting their goods before the people that they are already obliged to enlarge their plant, and accordingly have placed an order for more machinery in order to meet the increasing strain and demand for their splendid Ribbed Hosiery for men and boys, as well as Fancy Golden Crown Sweaters and high grade Underwear.

At first the company secured a "five years' lease" on the one building which they occupy, but it was soon discovered by the company that they would need more room, so they secured themselves by purchasing not only the building which they first leased but also the adjoining building, which they can now plainly see, before many months they will be forced to occupy. In order to enlarge in this manner, the directors decided to sell another \$10,000.00 of capital stock, which will make a \$25,000.00 paid up capital—all now subscribed for.

Mr. Spencer was asked, "How do you account for the company's wonderful success in so short a time?" "Well," he replied, "I cannot hardly understand it myself. It is better even than we looked for—and we looked for something pretty good. We have made it our high aim to manufacture nothing but the best; second, if ever a mistake or slip has been made we have spared no pains to immediately correct it. Consequently whenever the people have once used our goods we have gained their friendship, and the people's friendship, thus gained, as you know, means everything in business. Another reason perhaps is that we have endeavored to make a variety and class of goods a little different from other western factories, which has taken well with the people, and we believe has helped our success."

"Do you think that your success has in any way taken advantage or trade away from other knitting factories?" "Not in the least. We have aided them all by showing the western people what home industry means and can do."

"How many hands do you give employment?" "Both in the factory and those in our employ as salesmen number over fifty."

"We understand you have a branch, called the Park City Ensign Branch." "Yes," we have. Mr. Jos. J. Armstrong, running that branch for us, and if our business keeps on increasing as it is now doing we expect to soon open up a store on Main street, some steps have already been taken in this direction."

"About what is your capacity at the present time?"

"About 150 suits underwear, 600 pairs of hosiery besides sweaters, togues and baby sets and specialties of all kinds. Of course, in starting up we have not averaged our capacity, but we hope to double or more, the present capacity before the end of another year. "During the past five months we have manufactured and sold about 12,000 garments, 2,000 union-suits, 3,000 shirts and drawers—which gives us an average of a little over 130 suits per day and we are so sure of our up to the machines now that we have orders enough now in the house to run us at full capacity for over 30 days, and this," continued Mr. Spencer, "seems very encouraging to us and ought to inspire Home Industry in the entire West."

We think so too. And the people ought to feel encouraged to see our home made goods coming to the front.

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Cup On Exhibition—The handsome sweepstakes cup won by the Utah fruit growers at Boise, is now on exhibition at the Commercial club. It is valued at \$250 and is about two gallons capacity. On the bowl of the cup is inscribed, "Sweepstakes prize, awarded to Utah, for the best display of fruit, at the fourteenth annual meeting of the Irrigation congress, Sept. 3, 1906."

Army Officers Here—Brig. Gen. Mc Caskey, commanding the department of the Colorado, arrived yesterday, on a trip of inspection, accompanied by his aid, first lieutenant H. M. Banks, head of the Twentieth infantry. They were met at the depot by Capt. H. L. Kinnison of the Twenty-ninth infantry and escorted to the Post where the general went through the regular inspection. He called on the governor this noon, and is credited with stating that a full regiment of infantry is slated for Fort Douglas.

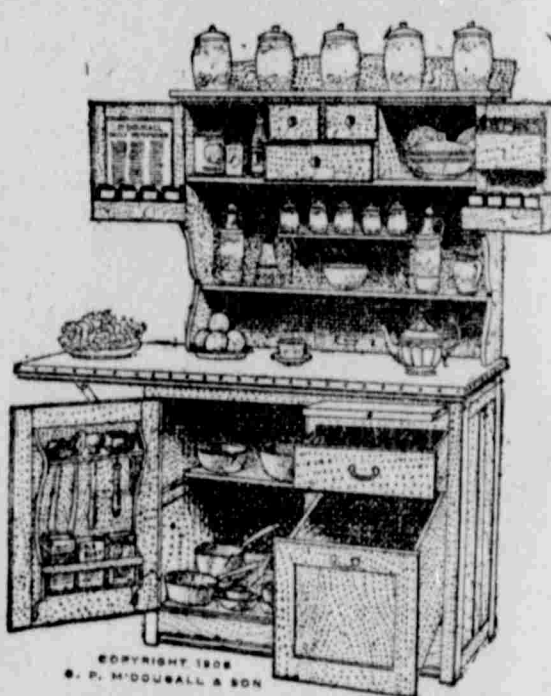

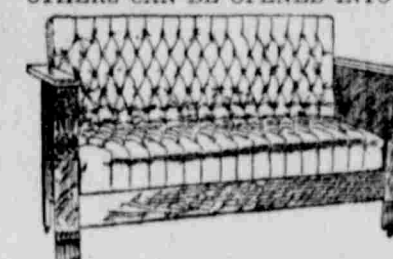

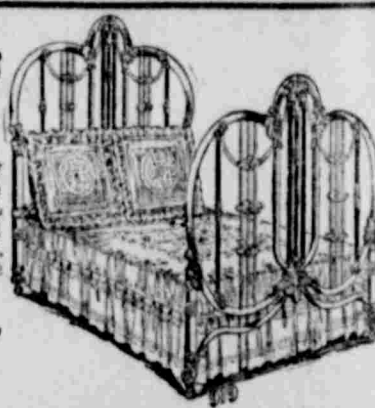
