other property, consisting in part of ac-

curities, but mainly of real estate in

Auburn and vicinity, he divides into

four equal shares amongst his sons and

his adopted daughter, Olive Risley

Seward, two of his sons, Frederick and

William, being deputed to execute this

provision. No other legacies or be-

quests are made. The property has not

yet been appraised, and it is impossible

to say precisely what it will amount to,

but it will probably not be far from

\$200,000.
