### AMERICAN WOMAN HONORED BY ROYALTY.

The appointment of George Bakhmetleff as the new Russian Minister to Japan, is due in a large measure to his beautiful and tactful wife, who was Miss Mary Beals, of Washington.

Bakhmetleff owes much of his success as a diplomat to his wife, whom he when secretary of the Russian Lem married in Vienna while her father, Gen, Edward F. Beale, of California, was minister to Austria in 1876+1877.

For her work in helping to bring about the liberation of Miss Ellen M. Stone from the bandits who abducted her, and for her bumanity in relieving the wants of the hundreds of refugees from Macedonia, Mrs. Bakhinetieff was decorated by the Czar and Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria, and the sultan of Turkey honored her with the Grand Cordon of the Order of Chefulkat.

While Bahkmetieff is esteemed as a high type of the Russian diplomat his appointment to a position so delicate at the moment is regarded in European diplomatic circles as a nice compliment to the United States for President Roosevelt's activity in restoring peace.




