SOMETHING OF BELDAME.

Great Animal's Stare Was Not Much of a Performer. As Beldame is the acknowledged greatest 3-year-old in America today, and probably the greatest 3-year-old filly in the world, it is remarkable that nothing gets into print about her pedigree. Octagon, her sire foaled at the Nursery Stud in 1884, was not a great performer, his winning efforts being in the Brooklyn Derby, the Morris park Toboggan handicap twice, the Withers and a purse. He was most creditably placed, however, several times, beaten by the efforts of the adjuster of weights, Octagon, on the side of his sire, imported Ryon, of the "super-elite" Eclipse, in the Bruce-Lowe pedigree scheme Octagon belongs to family 15, which up to St. Octon's good heat for the Derby in 1884, had produced no classic winner. It is to be noted, however, that it is the line from which springs the famed "Ames family" of England. The dam of Octagon, imported Ordeal, belongs to the same "Ames family" which produced the "Ames" century of Ordeal. Beldame's dam, imported Bella Donna,

is by Hermit, the tremendously sensational Derby winner of 1867, he also in the direct male line from Bellego, Bella Donna belongs to family 15 of the Bruce-Lowe pedigree scheme, obscure until Blink Bonny stepped on the planet and repeated the performance of his father, up to then unrivaled of whom both the Derby and the Oaks. It should not be overlooked that Beldame is a sister in blood to Pen du Gros, winner of stakes and several purses and the establisher of several track records, and one of the best race horses uncovered in later days in this country.
