## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Northwesterners**—The Salt Lake County Northwestern society will meet at 1:30 p. m. Saturday in the city and county building.

**Bank Clerks Meet Tonight**—This evening's meeting of the local bank clerks at the Commercial club will be one of the most interesting in the season's series.

**Three Story Structure Planned**—The property east of the Commercial theater just acquired by J. P. McGeath, is to be improved by tearing down the present building there and the erection of a three story structure.

**Information Sought**—Acting Consul Bulk of the Austro-Hungary consulate at San Francisco, has written to Postmaster Thomas making inquiry for one Charles Maier, who when he heard from his friends was in this city.

## STOCKADE RAIDED BY SHERIFF SHARP

### Violation of Injunction is Believed To Have Occurred Last Night.

## NIGHTWATCHMAN ON GUARD.

He Was Also Arrested for Interfering With Officers—Four Women Are in Custody.

In accordance with an injunction granted by the Third district court, Sheriff Sharp with several deputy sheriffs raided the West Side stockade last night and arrested four women and a man. If it can be proven that they were there for immoral purposes, the stockade promoters will be cited for contempt of court.

As soon as Sheriff Sharp and his men entered the place, they were "spotted" by Night Watchman J. A. Whitman. In an instant the brightly illuminated houses were plunged into darkness. The officers succeeded in gaining entrance to two houses, however, but the alarm was given. Whitman was arrested on the charge of interfering with an officer and the women who gave the names of Alice Graham, D. Donaldson, C. Taylor and Louise Hamilton, were charged with vagrancy.

Attys. representing the residents in the neighborhood have been waiting patiently until the absolute injunction of the court was violated and if the proper evidence has been secured, the promoters of the stockade will be cited for contempt of court.

## DES MOINES PLAN HIGHLY FAVORED

Businessmen, Bankers and Professional Men Urge Passage Of Proposed Bill.

## POLICE COMMISSION MEASURE

This Has Many Friends, But Its Provisions Are Met in Other Act—Is Now With Committee.

The Des Moines plan of civic government for Salt Lake has now behind it a large group of the most representative citizens of Salt Lake. In a large petition submitted to the legislature this afternoon, reasons for giving Salt Lake this plan of government were set forth, backed by the signatures of a group of business men including every banker, leading professional men, and almost every large business house of the business district. Many signed who two years ago had but little faith in the commission system proposed at that time by the Civic League. The petition represents a volunteer movement on the part of those signing. No campaign was made to secure signatures, but those were accepted that came in during two afternoons of work, in which petitions were placed in banks and leading business houses to be signed by those wishing to.

The residence district was not given an opportunity to sign. It has been decided to let the petition rather be from the heads of business houses, banks and prominent professional men. Whether the Des Moines bill will get a hearing this session is not certain. It may be referred to the senate committee on county and municipal corporations and there are many advocates of a fire and police commission bill, which will have no need to pass if this bill passes. The fire and police commission bill is supported by an active lobby and it is trying hard to line up friends enough to see it through.

## FINDS MANY SUPPORTERS.

The work for the Des Moines plan has been going on steadily since the last legislative session. Its advocates being people anxious to take away from the city government the cumbersome system of political machinery and thus free the city's revenues for work on the roads and the sidewalks, and in directing securing direct results in the form of a more beautiful, commonwealth. The present system, they hold, has become clogged with dead timber, whose only service is to absorb the city's finances.

In the course of the Municipal League's campaign, friends have come to its banners from many unexpected sources. Last summer, when a trip of inspection to Des Moines was planned, Ogden citizens now advocate the plan for cities of the second class as well as the first. A delegation from Logan headed by J. A. Hendricks, met yesterday with Speaker Robinson of the house, and impressed upon him the importance of having a system extended to cities of the third class as well. In that case a change is asked for, however, by limiting the size of the commission to three instead of five. In previous sessions of the legislature Salt Lake business men to the senate this afternoon a committee from the Civic League held a brief conference with the committee on county and municipal corporations.
