CHIEF DEVINE'S BATTLE.

The Way He Succeeded in Winning for Salt Lake.

A Good Speech Before the Convention of Free Chicks in Atlanta Secured Salt Lake the Next Day.

There were many offers, and most of them very flattering ones, from other pretentious cities in the United States for the local national convention of free chicks; and the choice of each city were ardently pressed by the ambitious chiefs who coveted the location of the session of '95. Chief Devine, however, after this city, succeeded in carrying off the plum. He read the invitation to Salt Lake City and then pressed his suit in the following words:

In presenting this invitation, I did not suppose it could be necessary to say anything in regard to the matter. I presume that all of those gentlemen present, a large majority of whom were in Montreal at the last convention, are almost sure to be of the opinion that without exception—without question, the next national convention should be held in Salt Lake City. This was more forcibly impressed upon my mind when I reached the Mountains. I observed some of the Southern cities and was met with a response somewhat similar to that which we understood, in the South, that the next convention will be held in Salt Lake City. We who were at the convention in Montreal, or nearly so, are all agreed that Salt Lake City for 1895. We gave you our word upon that occasion that we would use our efforts and voice to have the next convention in our own city. We are now here, and we hope you would not want to impeach the word of a Southern chief.

So far as the other cities striving for this honor are concerned, I have nothing to say, except that some of my opponents in the matter have, as I have been informed, resented today to tactics which I feel were not exactly honorable.

I assure you our town is large enough, and hospitable enough and generous enough, and has all the accommodations that are required to handle a convention of this size. As a result of the convention, we will have less than one-fourth the cost of the convention from Chicago to Salt Lake City, and I assume that my friends in the East will take care of the other end of the bill.

The question has been further considered in regard to holding an international meeting. When I heard this report of the committee this evening, it reminded me of the mistake that was made in 1892, when the Chinese held their convention, when there are so many of their own friends who need their attention and practical assistance.

I had Mr. Chairman, in looking over this old report, that this convention has never been west of the Missouri river. Kansas City is the nearest west that they have ever been. We have here a country of something like 3,000 miles in width, and for twenty years, past, this convention has been held in the eastern half of the United States. How do you expect to gain membership in the West? I don't know that the gentlemen here have ever thought of looking at the map, in fact, I never thought of it myself with any degree of force until today. There (indicating on a map) is the part of the United States where the twenty-three conventions of this association have been held, and here (indicating again) are the eighteen great states and territories of the great West that have never had the honor of having a convention in one of their cities.
