Be it further resolved that we heartily approve and indorse the action of the National Reciprocal Demurrage convention held in Chicago, Jan. 5, and the action of the committees at that convention. In conclusion Dr. Paden said: "This toleration of polygamous liv-ing means the toleration of polygamy, the toleration of adultery, with relig-ious sanctioh. Acknowledging as we may, that the majerity of the people of Utah do not dare to do other than acquiesce, that Senator Smoot has ac-quiesced, is no reason why the people of the nation should let polygamous living alone and to call out being sat-isfied as no more than religious toler-ance.

"Reed Smoot is in harmony with the quorum to which he is subject when he acquiesces in the continuation of this crime against God and man; but can it be possible that Senator Knox is in harmony with his constituency in Penn-sylvanit. In harmony with the moral and religious will of the people of the United States, when he becomes the devil's advocate before the senate of the United States, and makes a plea for the religious toleration of polygam-

After some delay, the committee on resolutions reported as follows: Your committee having considered the several matters submitted to it, now legs to offer the following for your conideration: Whereas, the sale of Portland cement

direct to consumers and block manufac-turers by the manufacturers is a men-ace to and a disturbing feature in the cement trade in the territory covered by this association; and Whereas, the restricting of the sale

of cement by manufacturers and their agents to dealers only will work no hardship to them or in any way restrict the manufacture or sale of the

same; Be it resolved that it is the sense of this convention that the manufacturers of Portland cement should restrict the sale of their products to lumber and other legitimate coment dealers. Whereas the present high price on lumber and building materials is un-doubtedly restricting building opera-tions; and Whereas the retail lumber dealers are charged with combining for the purpose

Whereas the retail lumber dealers are charged with combining for the purpose of raising the prices to the disadvan-tage of the consumer; and Whereas the retailers of lumber pro-ducts are in no way responsible for the present high prices on building materi-al because it is a matter over which they have no control, but on the con-trary, the manufacturers are directly responsible for the present high price of all kinds of building materials. Therefore, he it resolved by the West-ern Retail Lumbermen in annual con-vention assembled, that we condemn and deplore the present high prices of jumber products as restricting building operations throughout the territory cov-

operations throughout the territory cov-ered by this association, the same be-ing detrimental to the best interests of the country in general.

WANT REDUCTION.

Resolved, further, that it is unfain Resolved, further, that it is unfair for the manufacturers and wholesalers to put the burden of the high prices on the retail lumber dealers, and we, therefore, ask that they reduce the price of lumber material as far as pos-sible consistent with the cost of manu-facture, and at all events that the price of lumber be not increased above those now prevaling, if a reduction be im-possible. possible

possible. Resolved, further, that a copy of these resolutions be spread upon the minutes of this association, and a copy be forwarded to the manufacturers' as-sociations of the Pacific coast states and other manufacturers from whom we buy.
