

UNHOLZ BEATEN BY CHAMPION

Joe Gans Knocks Out Boer Aspirant in the Eleventh Round.

Colored Man Shows Great Cleverness While Rudolph Depends Mostly Upon His Strength.

San Francisco, May 14.—Joe Gans, the lightweight champion, added another victory to his long string tonight by defeating Rudolph Unholz, the rugged fighter from South Africa, in the eleventh round. The fight was a close one, but Gans systematically beat down Unholz and the referee interfered in the eleventh round, as Unholz was then practically knocked out.

Unholz, who had been a contender for the title, was a very strong fighter, but Gans, who is a very clever fighter, was able to stand the punishment. In the tenth round, Gans hit Unholz with a right hand, and Unholz was knocked down. Gans then hit him with a left hand, and Unholz was knocked out.

At the end of the first round Gans had a slight lead, having partially closed Unholz's left eye with a right hook. Gans showed great cleverness, while Unholz depended mostly upon his strength.

Gans seemed a bit slow in the second round, and Unholz had slightly the better of it. He right caught Gans on the jaw as the latter was coming in.

The third round was a bit in favor of Unholz, who landed some good punches, while Gans several times cleft the air with misdirected arm swings.

The fourth was a left uppercut and the Boer went down for the count of five. Gans appeared to be striking his best at this stage of the contest.

In the fifth Gans had solved the Boer's style of fighting and easily held his man off at the same time occasionally planting his left to the face. It was Gans' round.

In the sixth, the Boer fought back strongly, and did not appear to be in the least distressed from Gans' fusillade. It was Gans' round.

At the end of the seventh Gans had a big lead and it looked at this stage as if it would be easy sailing, although the Boer fought back viciously and seemed not to have weakened to any great extent.

PRINCE ZU EULENBURG'S RESIDENCE SEARCHED

Berlin, May 14.—The residence at Libenberg of Prince Philipp Zu Eulenburg, who is charged with the conspiracy in connection with the Harden revelations of last summer, was searched today for political correspondence. The result is not yet known. The investigation was conducted by a commission and a number of the prince's papers were gone over. Early this morning the commission called upon the prince, who is a prisoner in the Charlottenburg hospital, and requested the key of his private desk.
