Weber County Business Transacted by the Board of Commissioners.

Only One Case of "Smallpox" in Weper Outside of Ogden - Nominees for School Board.

The city council met in regular session last evening and transacted the following business:

The claim of the Ogden City Waterworks company for repairs to pipe injured while the city was inspecting the watermains was tabled.

The committee on laws reported approving the lease of the city hospital to the Ogden general hospital for ten years, with a minor amendment. The report was adopted and the lease approved.

This committee also recommended that the petition of James H. Worrall to annul, cancel and reduce to acreage, the plat of Corbett Addition, be not granted. The report was adopted.

## SENSATIONAL ARREST. M. W. Mansfied Held for Ruining

Water System. Special Correspondence

Thurber, Wayne Co., Nov. 23 .- Thurber had quite a sensation today. M. W. Mansfield was arrested by the sheriff of Wayne county on a charge of ma-licious mischief, he having, on the 21st insta proceeded to Cottonwood canyon and tore up two or three lengths of the town water pipe, thus leaving the town without water. This is a serious offense before the law and Mansfield

will be held over to the district. The trouble arose over some peculiar methods adopted by Mansfield to raise money to bring water into town. Interest bearing notes were sold to the people in favor of the Thurber Water Supply Co., and pipe was bought and the people furnished the labor. The water was piped in about two years age. Labor or cash was counted as capital stock and those who furnished capital stock and those who furnished either were credited with stock in pro-portion to what they had paid. Water rates were levied on all, and stock-holders were allowed a dividend of six per cent on their capital stock. But the proceeds or profits not coming up to Mansfield's wishes or expectations, he conceived the idea that it would be a smoot thing to sell out to the neople a good thing to sell out to the people. He then "let the cat out the bag." The Thurber Water Supply Co, was a myth. The people had no interest in the water-The people and no interest in the water-works. The pipe was all Mansfield's, so he said, and the people must buy him out in hard cash or else he would tear up the pipe and sell it elsewhere. The people could not see it in this light, as they had in good faith invested their labor and means to full the plus there. labor and means to put the pipe there and the pipe belonged to the waterworks system, and all that remained was for them to pay their water rates as they fell due. "Not so," said Mans-field, "you must buy me out, and if you don't I will tear up your pipe." And accordingly he went to the canyon on the 21st and did tear it up, with the result above stated.
