Ogden Junction, Dec. 7—

Mr. George Marsh has returned from Omaha where he has been on business connected with the lands between Ogden and Willard, which were used by the railroad company. He has settled with the land owners, and those of them with whom we have conversed express themselves perfectly satisfied with the manner in which Mr. Marsh has conducted the business.

So those who went to see a King didn't have the opportunity to feast their eyes upon royalty.

The Naturalization Laws.

The Sacramento Record, as we have before noticed, has taken umbrage at the naturalization laws, and thinks that they ought to be so remodelled that acquisition of citizenship would be a slower and more difficult process. The reason the Sacramento Record gives for advancing the change is, that political matters are growing more and more corrupt, especially in large cities, and that the foreign element as it entered into the ranks of the people, was more likely to become mischievous and demoralized than any other. Now two wrongs never made one right, so therefore we shall refrain from calling the attention of our California namesake to the fact, that it is singular, that while lamenting the introduction of foreigners into the voting classes, on account of their lack of appreciation of the true value of and the responsibilities incurred by the right of suffrage, yet it cordially supported giving the ballot to 800,000 negroes, not one in a thousand of whom could or would place a proper estimate on the privilege with which they were endowed. However, passing by these contradictory positions, it would seem to us that the Sacramento Record jumps at a very violent conclusion, when it charges naturalized citizens with being more likely to indulge in fraudulent practices than those to the manor born. As a general rule a great majority of the emigrants that reach the shores of the United States, are pushing, intelligent and industrious, and as they gradually become absorbed in the mass of the people, they form some of the most valuable classes of citizens that the country possesses. It has always been considered that the influx of emigrants seeking homes and employment was one of the sources of the great prosperity of the country, and contributed more than anything else to its rapid settlement and reduction to the uses of man. Looking at the matter in this light, the remarkable falling off in the numbers of emigrants arriving on the Atlantic coast, has been noticed with much regret and misgiving. Seeing this, is it not quite singular that the Sacramento Record should still further discourage immigration by advocating such an alteration in the naturalization laws as would render the privilege of suffrage more difficult of acquisition by the foreign born citizen.—Pioche Record.

That Unlucky Mr. Poland.

The more earnestly and laboriously that unlucky Mr. Poland tries to mend matters by explaining, the worse mess he makes of it. His recent note to General Butler has brought the St. Louis Democrat down on his back like a thousand of brick. Most of our readers know that the Democrat, in spite of its name, has been for years the great republican newspaper of Missouri. It asserts that Judge Poland did make the remarks to its reporter, at the Lindell House, in the presence of two or more witnesses. And then it goes on to use such reprehensible language as this: "If the eminent old donkey is ashamed of what he said, he might easily withdraw it without imputing misrepresentation to this or other St. Louis papers."—Springfield, Mass., Republican.

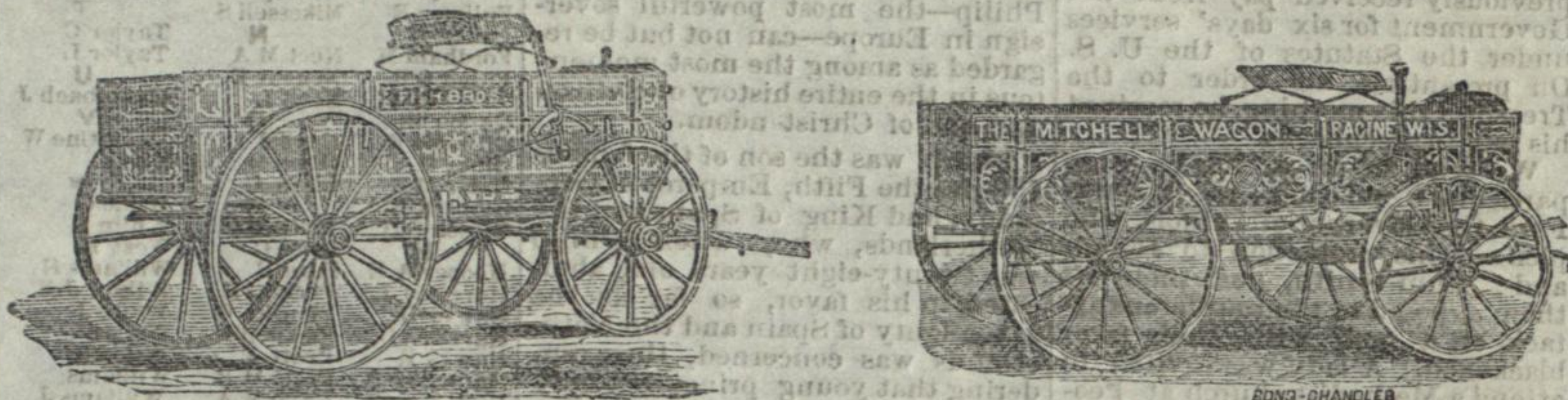
