UTAH IS IN REPUBLICAN COLUMN.

Presidential Electors, Congressman, State Ticket and Legislature All That Way—Cache Still Democratic, but Utah County Caught in the Slide.

The election is over. The big fight has been won and lost. Utah is in the Republican column and the eagle flaps its wings triumphantly above the rooster which stands no longer in a defiant attitude. The returns are yet incomplete, but enough is known to make it probable that the Republican majority will run anywhere from 1,500 to 4,000. The McKinley electors lead the ticket, though the Congressman and State candidates, Governor Wells at their head, follow closely after.

THE NEXT SENATOR.

Now that the complexion of the Legislature is assuredly Republican, the question of a new Utah State senator looms again into prominence. The name which heads the list of candidates on the Republican side today is George H. Wood, Democratic candidate for county auditor, over Frank T. Hines, Republican candidate for the same office. Full returns not being available, the authorship is yet in doubt. On all the others, the probability is that the Republican side will carry the senatorial and legislative tickets are elected.

As to the sheriff and auditor, the returns from 33 districts make the following showing:

SALT LAKE COUNTY TICKET.

The Salt Lake county ticket is mixed, with a certainty that the Democratic candidate for sheriff, G. Ham Naylor, is elected over the Republican nominee, Jos. Y. Smith, by perhaps more than 600, and the possible success of George H. Wood, Democratic candidate for county auditor, over Frank T. Hines, Republican candidate for the same office. Full returns not being available, the authorship is yet in doubt. On all the others, the probability is that the Republican side will carry the senatorial and legislative tickets are elected.

THE LEGISLATURE.

In Will Be Republican on Joint Ballot.

The Legislature is undoubtedly Republican on joint ballot. The count has been going on all night and well into today, and is not yet complete. The latest returns have somewhat changed the majority from what it was thought to be last night. The Democrats will control the Senate, having 11 members, and the Republicans seven, seven of the Democrats being hold-overs. John G. M. Barnes of Davis county wins by a majority so narrow that it may take an official count to settle it, though he estimated in a telephone message to the "News" today that he had thirty-five margin to his credit. The count is still going on in Salt Lake county, and Democrats claim that, when finished, it will show the election of at least Judge Henderson and Henry W. Lawrence to the Senate, and Rufus S. Wells and Mahori Spencer to the House. This the Republicans deny. If this claim should prove to be correct, it would reduce the Republican total to 28 and increase the

missioners, H. N. Standish, J. H. Anderson, and Henry Barker, all of whom are against the Democratic ticket. The 32 districts yet to come in are not likely to change materially the relative proportion of the figures. The average difference between the county counts and the returns on the Republican and Democratic tickets respectively in the 56 districts reported is 200 votes in favor of the Republicans, thus insuring their success.

OTHER OFFICERS.

The rest of the ticket in Salt Lake county shows Republican success by from 100 to 600. On the entire list, except sheriff and auditor. There was a lively contest between the respective candidates for the county clerkship, with the outcome in favor of John James by about 600 votes. He secured, in 60 election districts, 822 more than his competitor, B. T. Lloyd, and the remaining districts figure up a balance in his favor of 1,000. The total of the ticket that has been canvassed so far that Mr. James is likely to be a gainer rather than loser.

The canvass will be completed and reported in the main tonight, and more complete figures can be given tomorrow. The claim is made, however, by the Democratic committee, that the Republican ticket is elected county clerk over L. M. East, Republican, and that W. H. Dale is elected county treasurer over W. O. Carls, Republican. If these claims are correct, it would make still further changes toward a mixed ticket than the partial returns yet completed would indicate.

Later this afternoon the Democrats claim that the count would show the election of D. O. Rideout to the Senate, and J. S. Hyde to the House, as well as that of Henderson, Lawrence, Spencer and Wells. The Republicans refuse to concede the claim.

THE JUDICIAL TICKETS.

First District—In this district, which comprises Cache, Boxelder and Rich counties, C. H. Hart, Democrat, has succeeded himself as judge over W. W. Maughan, Republican. Second District—In this district, which comprises Kane, Garfield and Mohave counties, F. H. Holmstrom, Democrat, has succeeded himself as judge over J. C. Walters, Republican.

Second District—Weber, Morgan and Davis counties. J. H. Morris, Democrat, has succeeded himself as judge over J. C. Walters, Republican. Third District—Summit, Salt Lake and Tooele. The probabilities are that all of the Republican nominees, Marion Ritchie and Lewis are elected, though the latter has been scratched considerably in this county in favor of W. C. Hall, a fact that may bring about the election of the latter. The other two Democratic candidates, Richards and Stewart, are undoubtedly defeated as is also Hemstedt. Democratic candidate for attorney, the latter by Elchorn, Republican.

Fourth District—Utah, Wasatch and Uintah counties. For judge, both Republican, was chosen to succeed himself as judge over J. C. Walters, Republican. For attorney, S. A. King, was beaten by A. C. Hatch, Republican.

Fifth District—Juab, Millard, Beaver and Washington counties. Republican, Democrat, Hines, Republican, nominee for judge; attorney, Greenwood, Democrat; Murdoch, Republican. Sixth District—Sevier, Plute, Wayne, Garfield and Kane counties. Republican, is probably elected judge over Stewart, Democrat. As is also Chidister, Republican, over Eckersley, Democrat. Seventh District—Sanpete, Carbon, Emery, Grand and San Juan counties. Jacob Johnson, Republican, succeeds himself as judge over Ferdinand Erickson, Democrat, and W. D. Livingston, Republican, is elected over W. K. Reed, Democrat, as attorney.
