THE LEGISLATURE.

In Will Be Republican on Joint Ballot. The Legislature is undoubtedly Republican on joint ballot. The count has been going on all night and well into today, and is not yet complete the latest returns have somewhat changed the majority from what it was thought to be last night. The Democrats will control the Senate, having members, and the Republicans seve seven of the Democrats being hold overs. John G. M. Barnes of Davi county wins by a majority so narrow that it may take an official count to ettle it. though he estimated in elephone message to the "News" toda telephone message to the "News" today that he had thirty-five margin to his credit. The count is still going on in Salt Lake county, and Democrats claim that, when finished, it will show the election of at least Judge Henderson and Henry W. Lawrence to the Senato, and Rulon S. Wells and Mahonri Spencer to the House. This the Republicans deny. If this claim should prove to be correct, it would reduce the Republican total to 38 and increase the

THE NEXT SENATOR.

Now that the complexion of the Log-Islature is assuredly Republican, the question of a new United States senator looms again into prominence. The name which heads the list of candidates on the Republican side thus far is ex-Senator Arthur Brown, a number of whose friends are known to have been elected to the Legislature. Other names are Postmaster Thomas and Hon. Thomas Fitch, while the names of Hoyt Sher-man and O. J. Salisbury are also being put forward by their friends.
