FINAL ORDEAL OF KATHERINE GOULD

Called Back to Witness Stand to Explain Away, if Possible, Damaging Testimony.

CUESTIONED FOR TWO HOURS.

Chauffeurs, Grooms, Stablemen, Shopkeepers, Laborers and Other Servants Branded as Llars.

New York, June 24.-Katherine Clemmons Gould was called back to the stand for a final ordeal today, to explain away, if possible, the damaging testimony given by the witnesses ing testimony given by the withesses for her husband in her suit for separation and alimony of \$250,000 a year. It was a day of denials, beginning with the reading of the deposition of Dustin Farnum, who denied all allegations of improper conduct with Mrs. Gould and ending with Mrs. Gould's repeated denials of practically everything in word or action attributed to her by the witnesses for the other side.

her by the witnesses for the other side.

For two warm hours Mrs. Gould answered the carefully-framed questions of her counsel, repudiating with a monotonous flat denial all the testimony charging her with excessive drinking profanity or other impropriety. Chauffeurs, grooms, stablemen, shopkeepers, laborers and other servants and employes were alike branded with the short and ugly epithet. She never drank to excess, never used profane language, never forgot her dignity at mistress of Castle Gould and never overstepped the bounds of propriety according to her statements.

She told her counsel she never tried to hitch ap a pair of mules, never ordered dishes and food thrown from her St. Regis apartments, never referred to Dustin Parnum as "my new beau," never quarreled with her husband before company, never luid a coachman's arm about her waist to hold her on the carriage seaf, never discharged an employe in anger, never became intoxicated aboard the Niagara, never consumed two quarts of cocktalls in two days.

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consumed two quarts of cocktails in two days.

Mrs. Gould's explanation of her friendship with Dustin Farnum naturally took up much of her time today. Her testimony held close to the line drawn in the deposition offered in behalf of Farnum, who was unable to appears it was announced, on account of illness.

Whatever intimacy there was between her and the actor was accounted for by her desire to have his advice regarding her plans to return to the stage.

"My home had been broken up," she said, "all authority had been taken from me, my happiness was gone and I wanted some occupation to divert my mind. I thought of returning to the stage and wanted to talk the matter over with Mr. Farnum, who, I was convinced, would be able to help me."

She had not seen Farnum, she said from 1904 until 1906, when she talked with him about returning to the stage.

Mrs Gould sald Farnum was seven in her parlor at the St. Regis except on the August afternoon in 1904, when they lunched together, with several others present, and on the occasion of the automobile accident on Long Island, when they returned there to arrange for ball for the chauffeur. She never addressed Mr. Farnum by any endearing names, she said, and never permitted any improper familiarity.

Only once was the even ripple of the question and answer between Mr. Shearn and Mrs. Gould disturbed.

SHEFFIELD AGAINST THE SOCIETY SYSTEM

New Haven, Conn., June 25,-A lead-New Mixed, Conn., June 25.—A leading point in the annual report of Director Russell H. Chittenden of the Sheffleid scientific school at Yale university this year is his criticism of the society system of the school, where there are

six societies owning their dormitories and representing property of great value. The fact that the school has now begun to build its own dormitories has brought the question into

The director, in referring to the prob-lem, criticize severely the society system of the school. He says the interests of the societies and the scholarship of the school are antagonistic, as proved by the fact that a much larger number of conditions in scholarlarger number of conditions in scholar-ship in proportion to their numbers have been incurred by society men than by the students outside of the societies. It is also proved, he says, from the fact that a good many men entering the freshman class belonging to societies are dropped at the end of the first term or later in the year, notwithstanding that a considerable portion of them enter school with good or fair records in scholarship.

INSTRUCTION IN GUARD **DUTY FOR PRIVATES**

Washington, June 25.—From the division of militia affairs in the war department there has been issued in handy pamphlet form, a series of instructions and problems in guard duty for the private soldier, prepared by Capt, M. C. Kerth of the Twenty-third infantry. M gives all the instructions contained in the manual of guard duty, which is necessary for a private to which is necessary for a private to

Admonition is given that soldiers must understand fully what the orders mean and must know just exactly how to carry them out.

The study of the solution of the problems presented is advised and the suggestion made that one of the best ways to learn to do guard duty is for two or three enlisted men to meet together and each get up problems for the others to solve. If an agreement is not, reached by them they are ordered to consult their officers.


A THOUSAND ICEBERGS.




