## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Burial in Dillon.**—The body of Mrs. McIntosh, late of Dillon, Mont., was taken from this city last night for burial. Mrs. McIntosh came to Salt Lake to live with relatives and died Thursday last of pneumonia at the age of 81.

## WENT TO JERICO THEN CAME BACK

Wool Auction Proves Flat Failure  
From Business Standpoint.

### NOT A POUND CHANGED HANDS

Bids Are Said to Have Been From Nine

Cents and Down—Storage Clips

Waiting Shipment.

Like the Duke of York who with ten thousand men marched up the hill and then—down again, wool buyers went to Jericho and then—came back again. As a business trip could not have been improved, as a business trip it was an unqualified failure. Bids offered for the 750,000 pounds of wool open for sale at auction were all rejected, so not a pound changed hands. This brought joy to the Utah Wool Growers' association's heart. It says this shows plain that anything that Utah growers are sold for better prices, if they have to store for six months to get them.

Those who journeyed down to Jericho were: Marcus Harris of the R. Harris Wool company; W. M. Marston, of Halliwell, Jones & Donald, of Boston; H. S. Hall and R. W. Thacker, of J. Koshland of Boston; William Jackson and J. R. Edgill, of Jackson & Co., St. Louis; Harry Renard, of A. Frank & Co., Salt Lake; M. Addy, of Silverman & Co., Chicago; Percival Coffin, of Coffin & Son, Philadelphia; L. R. Anderson and R. M. Tuttle, of the Central Utah association at Monticello, which is said to represent Jeremiah Williams & Co., of Boston.

With the buyers were several representatives of the railroads. Among these were: C. H. H. of the Oregon Short Line, Mark Hopkins of the Washburn, F. A. Vincent of the Erie, Mr. Manchester of the Nickel Plate, P. S. Williams of the Milwaukee, William Darke of the Burlington, G. M. Frazer of the Illinois Central, and J. H. Mansfield of the Salt Lake Route. After the buyers had looked over the various clips, each wrote out his bid and handed it to the owner of the wool. An agreement was reached between the buyers and the owners, and it was announced that no bids were to be made public. Bids were from 9 cents down, J. M. Solomon, Marcus Harris and Henry Cohn are said to have made the only bids for outright purchase, the remainder of the bids being on consignment. Nine cars of wool are ready for shipment to Boston, where the wool will be stored, announces Secretary Stewart, E. H. Collier, E. J. Keam and a number of other big growers are quoted by Mr. Stewart as saying they will ship to Boston.
