

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

SABBATH MEETINGS.—In the morning Elder A. O. Smoot addressed the congregation, delivering many useful hints upon the duties and labors devolving upon the saints in building up the Kingdom of God on the earth. He was followed by President D. H. Wells, who spoke at some length upon the gospel of Jesus Christ, and the necessity of those who have embraced it, living according to its precepts.

In the afternoon the congregation was addressed by the Rev. Dr. Tiffany, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, his remarks being based upon the 21st and following verses of the 45th chapter of Isaiah. The reverend gentleman delivered a very able and eloquent discourse, showing that while God is just and cannot look with the least allowance upon the infraction of righteous laws, yet in Christ an atonement is provided so boundless in its extent that all the ends of the earth, if they will, may look to Him and be saved. He was listened to with the most respectful attention by a congregation of between 300 and 400 people.

The afternoon's services were closed by President Brigham Young, who, in his happiest vein, addressed the congregation for about half an hour. His remarks were reported and will probably appear in the News sometime during the present week.

THEATRICAL.—On Saturday evening the "Fire Fly" was presented a second time, and gave great satisfaction. A. The close of the piece Lotta was called before the curtain, and gratified those clamorous for "a speech" by briefly thanking the public for the kind reception she had received in Salt Lake City.
