A NOISY DEMONSTRATION.

THE dispatches have brought us news to the effect that several persons have become insane over the Presidential election. That is to say, they have become confirmed lunatics. There is no room for wonder at such a result. It is somewhat remarkable, considering the multitudes of cases of tem porary insaalty resulting from the same cause, that the number of instances where the permanent effect was produced were so few.
