Man Believed to be He. Under Arrest At Cananea, Mexico.

INFERNAL MACHINE SENT GOV. PENNYPACKER.

Newspaper clippings were tied around the box with small pieces of yellow ribbons. "Capitol dedication." "Keep to the right." 'Penrose.' "Pennsy." "Why is it?"

"Anarchist." The remainder formed a jumble from which no sense could be extracted. EXAMINING CONTRACTS TO FURNISH CHINESE.

Washington, Oct. 5.-The officers of the isthmian canal commission are busy ex-amining the proposals recently submitted by contracting firms for furnishing Chi-nesse labor for work on the canal at Panama. Because of the peculiar cond-tions surrounding the importation and employment of allens in this work, com-plicated in part by the adjustment of some international features which prob-ably will arise, several weeks must neces-sarily elapse before any conclusions are reached and the contract awarded. Both doubt is expressed whether con-tractors will be able to carry out any contract which may be awarded for sup-plying coolie labor. Preferably because of elimatic conditions, the isthmian com-mission desires that any laborers sent to the isthmus shall come from the softer provinces of China. This mortality was due large-ly to the unhealthy sanitary surround-ings then prevailing on the isthmus which, however, have been vasity improv-ed under the American administration of affairs. Petitions from Chinese residents in Peru, San Francisco and at Panama have been sent to the government at Pekin asking that it refuse its sanction to any proposition to permit contract la-borers to go from China to Panama. Thus far, however, the Chinese authorities have remained entirely neutral in the matter, and have not made any representations to the United States.
