### Local and Other Matters.

THERMOMETER 45 degrees F. in the shade at 1 p.m. to-day. Fine.

Theatre.—Of course everybody will want to go to the Grand Sunday School Union Concert at the Theatre on Monday night. It promises to be a great time, especially for the young people and their delighted parents.

Barter.—A few days since, on petition of four persons named Jones, the Legislature changed their names to Murphy, whereas a law remarked that he thought the Legislature preferred the old name system to a return of specie payments, as they had just exchanged about seven and a half years of Jones for about six hundred pounds of "murphy."

Theatre.—A very large audience assembled last night at the Theatre to see Professor Herrmann for the last time. Scandinavian Mission.—The following is an extract from a letter, dated at Copenhagen, Jan. 17, from Elder N. C. Flyvare, to Brother S. F. Neve of this city:—

"When I first came here I was called to labor in Stockholm and Gothenburg, where I was about seven months. I was called to reside over the Scandinavian Mission, and in that position have been much blessed. The mission is in a very good condition; some are being added to the Church all the time. We have 315 last year and the good work is progressing. We don't meet with as much opposition now as we used to in years gone by, having liberty of speech wherever we go. I have found, in my travels in Sweden, Norway and Denmark, that the prejudice against us as people is as it was once. When I have told the people I am an Elder from Utah, they have received me with much interest. The condition of the working classes is deplorable; thousands are out of employment and a good deal of suffering is the result. 'I feel proud of my mountain home and the privilege of being a representative of no noble people at the Legislature, and I am trying to make myself as useful as possible in the interests of the Kingdom of God.'"

Councilor Smoot presented the following report:—

"Gentlemen:—Your committee on municipal corporations and corporations, to whom was referred Hon. B. Snow's motion to appropriate the sum of \$3,000 annually, or so much thereof as may be necessary, out of the Territory treasury, to Salt Lake City Lunatic Asylum, for the care of transient or non-resident insane persons, respectfully recommend that the amount be increased to \$4,000; provided that the sum of \$4,000 be paid in advance, and the balance of the sum be paid in installments, for the relief of Salt Lake City, be allowed."

The consideration of (H. F. No. 27), "Appropriation Bill," was resumed, pending which the item of \$3,175.00 to Public Printer was referred to the committee on printing. Recess till 8 p.m.
