New York, April 15.-It is learned that President Buchanan, of the Inter-national Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, has declared off the strikes involving 5,000 men against the American Bridge company, pending a settlement of the difference by arbitration

The strikes ordered were for the recognition of the international associa-tion in this city, Albany, Buffalo, Phildelphia, Baltimore, Pittsburg, Chicago and other places.

A representative of the American Bridge company is quoted as saying that, although the company had not as yet received a visit from a local arbitration board since the holding of the last recent arbitration conference expected the strike to be soon settled.
