FOREIGN.

Great Britain.  
London, 9.—Another batch of  
amnestied Communists has arrived  
in Paris; among the number is  
Puteau Humbert, formerly editor  
of *L'Epouvantail*, and Victor  
Grellier, Minister of the Interior  
under the Commune. There was  
no demonstration on their arrival.

The persons exiled to the Island  
of Majorca, on suspicion of being  
Communists, have arrived there  
on Monday.

The Spanish Government will  
dispatch 5,000 troops to Cuba in  
October, and 5,000 more at a later  
date.

It is announced in Dublin that  
Charles Parnell, home rule member  
of Parliament for Meath, and other  
persons interested in the land ques-  
tion, contemplate sending an appeal  
to Irish people in all parts of the  
world, to aid in the creation of a  
clan of peasant proprietors in Ire-  
land.

In consequence of the proportions  
which the outbreak in Afghanistan  
has reached, officials consider it  
possible that General Roberts will  
await the cooperation of the other  
armies before advancing on Cabul.

Sawyer & Co., merchants of  
Bradford, have failed for £30,000.

The Austrian troops have met a  
friendly reception at Peshawar, one  
of the principal points occupied in  
the district of Nowi Bazar. The  
Turks evacuated the guard-houses  
on the approach of the Austrians.

The Great Yorkshire hand-  
loom was won by Dresden  
China; Carlton 2nd. If Parole had  
won today he would have incurred  
the extreme penalty in the race for  
the Carver's gold.

One of the greatest strikes ever  
known in the cotton trade at Ash-  
ton-under-Lyne, will probably be  
entered upon at the end of this  
week. The employers have de-  
clared their intention of with-  
drawing their notices of five per  
cent. reduction in wages, and the  
spinners and weavers have deter-  
mined to resist the reduction.

A strike among the cotton weavers,  
who were on strike for some time,  
has been settled. The employers have  
agreed to pay the strikers the wages  
of the present month, and the strike  
will probably be terminated.

The St. Petersburg Gazette ad-  
vocates a direct junction of the En-  
glish and Russian dominions in  
Central Asia by dividing Afghan-  
istan between the two countries.

A dispatch from Kabul, dated the  
10th inst., informs that the Afghan  
government has acceded to the  
American demand to be represented  
on the commission of the liquidation  
of the Egyptian debt.

The Standard, Berlin corre-  
spondent, referring to the Kuldja  
affair, asserts that Russia has of-  
fered to restore to China the north-  
western portion of the occupied ter-  
ritory, provided the Kirghiz nom-  
ads, who fled to China, be sent back  
to Kuldja.

The Daily News correspondent  
at Lahore says: Kurum and Can-  
dabar are quiet, but the northern  
districts are turbulent. Badakshan  
threatens to revolt. The Amer-  
ican position is believed to be perilous.  
The Cabul roads are closed.

A dispatch from Allahabad an-  
nounces that the infantry and some  
of the guns have already ad-  
vanced through Sahargardian  
Pass. It is expected that the En-  
glish will advance on Khusli in a  
week.

The Times Berlin says: It is stated  
that many persons were drown-  
ed in the inundation at St. Petersburg.
