

TELEGRAPHIC. ANOTHER DELUGE.

An Immense Flood of Water From
a Broken Reservoir.

PEOPLE TERROR STRICKEN.

Many Farmers Financially Ruined.—
Much Damage Done by a
Tornado.

URRANA, O., May 3.—The greatest calamity that ever came to the people of Logan and Hamilton counties occurred last night, when the Lewis reservoir broke and turned an immense flood of water upon the residences along its course.

A break 200 feet wide occurred, and the water came rushing down in a flood ten feet deep and three miles wide, completely submerging the country around and around everything in its way. In the course of the flood stood the houses of Jack Smith and William Devalt and a large number of tenant houses and barns and outbuildings. All these were submerged, though fortunately everything managed to escape from danger.

People fled in terror from their homes while the swift, rushing flood came on down the valley, taking everything before it. A portion of the town of Port Jefferson was badly flooded, Quincy, Loganville, DeGraff, Fiqua, Troy and Dayton, who in that order were flooded, suffered considerably. Hundreds of families left their homes and fled out at the reach of the coming terror.

So far no loss of life is reported, but as the floods outside they are likely to reveal more than one unfortunate who perished. It is impossible to give an estimate of the loss. The farmers are financially ruined.

The latest reports tonight from the scene of the flood are reassuring, and it is believed that such progress has been made as will prevent further breaking of the reservoir, but the low level banks are saturated and in a very dangerous condition. Should further rain fall no human power can say as what catastrophe might have been sent to the authorities at all the threatened points to prepare for the worst as well as they hastily can, and hope for the best.

A Tornado in South Carolina.

CHARLESTON, S. C., May 3.—A tornado passed through a portion of Lexington and Newberry counties today, tearing down houses and mills and destroying barns, stables and outbuildings. Much damage was done to orchards and woods. A white woman was killed and a number of persons injured.

SUNDAY CLOSING.

The Question Reviewed by the Judiciary Committee.

CHICAGO, May 3.—The Sunday closing question came up before the national committee today. In the state of a report from the judiciary committee on the resolution offered by J. L. Kinnebrew of Iowa, asking that the Sunday closing question be referred to the local directory. The judiciary committee reviewed all the previous action on the subject and found that the question was settled when the commission heretofore made an order modifying the former rule.

A large number of the national committee members favor the opening of the gates on Sunday. It is hardly probable that an effort will be made to amend the former rule by striking out the Sunday closing clause. It is said that the tickets are ready for use on Sunday next and that all preparations have been made to open the gates without announcing the fact until it is too late for legal interference.

THE FINANCIAL SITUATION.

Secretary Carlisle Says It Is Most Satisfactory.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 3.—A reporter asked Secretary Carlisle today whether, looking over the condition of gold in the treasury, he was satisfied at Chicago, there was anything to say regarding the financial situation. Secretary Carlisle said:

"I have nothing to be said as affairs are in a most satisfactory state. The department is not anxious. There is plenty of gold that can be utilized. I made an attempt to arrange a sale away from the acceptance of any gold by the treasury."

An official statement for the gold in the treasury made to Secretary Carlisle by his use at the cabinet meeting this afternoon, shows the gold in the treasury to be \$107,000,000. There is some talk of Secretary Carlisle going to New York for another conference with the bankers there, but nothing positive can be learned about it.

The total gold in the country is estimated by the treasury officials at \$109,000,000, of which \$19,000,000 is in circulation.

HAWAIIAN ISLANDS.

Mr. Spreckle interviewed on the Present Situation.

He Would Never a Republic Under Certain Conditions.—Mount
Rau.

HAN FRANCISCO, May 3.—The steamer Australia, today brought from Honolulu advice to April 13th. In an interview with an Associated Press correspondent Mr. Spreckle said his plans had hardly been outlined yet. The labor question is an all-important one and constitutes his only objection to annexation. Planters must have cheap labor and this must be available later. Spreckle said the laborer couldn't be restored.

"There are three conflicting elements," continued Spreckle, "missionaries, Kanakas and the third an opposing party of white adventurers who cannot be trusted. The Kanakas are simply children. There is a gap between them and the whites which cannot be bridged, the missing link of which will never be found. If I could find a man of ability whom I could trust I would favor a republic. The white element in the United States has been too much for the Kanakas. They could keep their ships there and protect us if we could not take care of ourselves."

The queen some days ago stated to one of her advisers that she was ready to accept the action of the United States. To Spreckle she said whatever the result might be she would not utter a murmur.

It is stated that if Spreckle were to exert the pressure of which he is capable not a few of the planters would also quietly follow his lead. The laborer is to be considered a valuable number of planters, but in what has not been ascertained.

The most important movement on foot is said to be the proposition which has been made to the provisional government to try to buy off the ex-queen and her family. The Hawaiian people have been told by an annual session to her of \$25,000.

Commissioner Blount is busy engaged in making a report preparatory to going to the Hawaiian Islands. The woman's patriotic league will forward a memorial to Commissioners of Hawaii, praying for the restoration of Liliuokalani.

Meetings for and against annexation are being held daily in different parts of the island.

A fund of \$5000 is being raised to purchase a service of plate as a testimonial of the good will of the citizens of Honolulu, to be presented to the Hawaiian people before he leaves for the states.
