The department will be open for the reception of students at the beginning of the next academic year, August 18th. It cannot yet be definitely announced to what extent instruction and training will be carried in the department. The pro-vision to be made in this respect will depend upon the probable patronage the school will receive at the com-mencement of, or during the year, of which nothing is yet definitely known. It is quite probable, however, that two classes will be organized, one of chil-dren, say those under 14 years of age, who have had but little or no instruc-tion of any kind; the other, of those over 14 years of age who have acquired F.
