At the Opening the Stock Market Was Very Quiet, Business Being Small.

Speculative Leaders Bid Up to Top Prices, Bringing Up Several Stocks Above Last Night's Close.

New York. Nov. 15.-Trading was very quiet at the opening of the stock market and the stocks which were under pressure yesterday showed some recovery, notably the transcontinental stocks. The coalers and the local tractions were also firm. There were a few straggling declines.

The strength of the tractions spread to the coalers and then radiated to other stocks, causing a substantial rise all around in the first hour. Union Pacific and Atchison gained large fractions but later weakened, and pressure also began in St. Paul and Amalgamated Copper, causing a general setback before 11 o'clock. The relapse forced Union Pacific below yesterday's close. American Tobacco advanced 3

The reaction caused declines from the best prices of 1@1% in St. Paul, Union Pacific, Sugar, Met.opolitan Street rail-way, Brooklyn Transit and Western Union before the buying to cover be-came effective enough to raily the market. On the rebound better prices than before were made for some stocks. especially Manhattan, Reading, Missouri Pacific and Smelting, the gain in the last named reaching 3 points,

At noon trading was duli nad prices were being shaded.

Bonds were irregular. Duliness of the market was relieved somewhat by bidding up of the speculative leaders to top prices. This brought Union Pacific, St. Paul, Atchison and People's Gas, which led the raise from 1 to 4 above last night. Consolidated Gas jumped 34. The local tractions and several other active stocks went higher than before.

The demand for stocks broadened and there were heavy purchases of some of the metal stocks. Invading Chicago Markets to an Alarming Extent. Chicago, Nov. 15,-Glucose honey under the attractive guise of "pure clover honey," is invading the Chicago markets to such an extent that the efforts of the state pure food inspectors are largely directed toward investigations of this imposition, says the Tribune. One entire carload of "honey" con-signed from California was barred from

the markets yesterday except as a plainly labelled adulteration. The analysis of the "honey" compos-ing the consignment showed that it con-tained from 50 to 60 per cent of glucose and as "pure honey" the stuff was con-demned. The consignee had the choice of selling it as a glucose mixture or of sending it back and he chose the latter course, at the same time cancelling other orders, which would have brought other large quantities of the glucose

other large quantities of the glucose honey to Chicago.

Unlike many of the adulterations which flood the market, the glucose honey is not regarded as an injurious mixture, and the pure food commissioners affirm that the imposition on the purchaser is one which injures his pocket book and not his health.

It is worth obaut one-fifth as much as real honey.

Magrath, Alberta, Canada, Nov. 11 .-Following is the result of our threshing for the past season;
By reference to the books of the two threshing machine companies it is shown that a little over sixty-two thousand bushels have been threshed. This grain was grown on 1,500 acres of land or an average of nearly forty bushels to the acre. Last year there were only to the acre. Last year there were only 600 acres broken, so you see a great portion of this grain was grown on broken sod. Some of the grain that was grown on last year's broken ground, went over eighty bushels to the acre. We have a little less than one hundred families living here, so we shall have a plenty of bread and to spare.
