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LITTLE GIRLS WEAR HATS OF TAFFETA SILK.

Children's millinery is very interesting this season. Broad brims, flat, round and full tam-o-shanter crowns are always becoming to small faces, and especially when the brim is of that drooping, sloping order which we see much of this season. Soft French felt and clipped beavers are in the majority, but there are some very novel as well as practical children's hats made entirely of silk and trimmed with the same material. In the pictures the very wide brim is made of the taffeta mounted smooth over a foundation of heavy duck supported with wires on the under-brim after it has been stitched quite close together within a couple of inches of the edge of the brim. The crown is a tam-o-shanter of the silk stitched and pleated into the head-size and the trimming is a huge stitched taffeta bow which lays across the front of the crown and the brim and is centered with a knot of the taffeta.
