

TERRITORIAL ITEMS.

CULLED FROM LATEST EXCHANGES.

—On Monday last, an eight year old boy, George Nash, of Spanish Fork, fell from a horse and broke his left arm below the elbow.

—Harry Dean, proprietor of the Bon Ton restaurant in Park City, Summit County, quietly departed from that burg on Wednesday last, leaving a number of bills unpaid.

—Flowing wells are being obtained in Utah County. Mr. James Harwood, of Lehi, last week, secured a flow of two and a half gallons of water per minute at a depth of 72 feet.

—On Thursday Bert Paxman, son of Mr. Wm. Paxman, of Provo, had his right leg amputated about three inches above the ankle joint. The bones of the ankle had been diseased and amputation was necessary.

—The Ogden City Council have passed an ordinance prohibiting bicyclists from riding on their machines on the sidewalks in certain parts of the city. A breach of the ordinance is made punishable by \$25 fine and 25 days' imprisonment.

—Last Monday afternoon, while Peter Sharp was hauling stone for Charles Hart, his team was struck by lightning, both horses were knocked down and one of them killed. Mr. Sharp was knocked off the wagon and a little boy of Mr. Hart's was severely stunned by the shock.

—Mm. Messenger was before Justice Madson of Brigham City, on Tuesday last, on the charge of stealing a buggy and span of horses from E. K. Fuller. He was bound over in the sum of \$300 to await the action of the grand jury of the First District Court.

—A few days ago Martin Lynch, who was engaged in driving a six-horse team laden with lumber from Purcell & Lynch's mill, at Lavel's gulch in Deer Lodge, County, Montana, was instantly killed by falling from the wagon, the hind wheel passing over him.

—The residence of Mr. Sherbourne near the C. P. track, Ogden, was broken into on Friday by tramps, and wearing apparel to the value of about sixty dollars was stolen. The police have captured one of the thieves and have recovered some of the property.

—Wm. Crump, a young colored man hailing from Kentucky, employed as a waiter at the Montezuma Hotel, Las Vegas, New Mexico, was the other day assassinated in Shoemaker Cañon, near Vegas, by being shot in the back of the head. The assassin is unknown.

—At Ogden, on Saturday, an inquest was held on the body of the infant found in Ogden river, as mentioned in Saturday's News. The verdict of the jury was that the infant was born alive and had been killed by a blow on the left side of the head, above the temple. To all appearances the infant had been murdered immediately after its birth. No clue has yet been discovered to the perpetrators of the fiendish crime.

—On Friday, August 21, a band of Apaches, numbering sixty, raided to within a short distance of the Mexican custom-house at San Pedro, Arizona, and in addition to running off a number of horses belonging to Linerada of the custom-house, also took several horses from a ranchman named Elias; but paid no attention to the herds of cattle on the mesas and in the valleys adjacent to the ranch. The Indians were in the vicinity from 8 a. m. to 4 p. m., and although there was a squad of Mexican soldiers and several line riders at the custom-house, who witnessed the feat of the Indians gathering the horses, no resistance was offered. A party of armed citizens left Tombstone for the Mexican border on Monday to assist in driving the renegades from the United States soil.
