

# FOGLER THROWS OVER LAWSON OUT

He Quits the Lead in the New York  
Six Day Bicycle  
Race.

## PLEADING HAS NO EFFECT.

New York, Dec. 9.—Plugging away in advance of all previous indoor bicycle records, three teams in the six-day race kept busy pedaling, and the thousands of spectators who crowded Madison Square Garden tonight before saw such earnest work since the saucer-shaped track was built 10 years ago.

During the day there were many changes in the relative standing of the teams, but it was not until nearly 5 o'clock that an important shakeup occurred. Then Morrie MacFarland decided they could steal a lap. Moran jumped out with a terrific sprint and lost almost lost a lap, but his partner, Rut, last year's winner, came on quickly, and by hard sprinting managed to regain the lost distance. ## LAWSON DECLARED OUT.

"I am all in," he said. "I've done all I know in this game, and I find I have taxed myself to the limit. I can play out and can't go any further."

Lawson found no other mate and was officially declared out of the race. The other racers in the contest kept at it and each hour added new figures to the record.
