

## STRIKERS CAME, SALT LAKE WON

Local Boys Beat Seattle in a Snappy Game of Ball.

## GOOD HITTING AND FIELDING

Every Man Played a Fast Game—Quick Gave Fine Performance of Pitching—Score, 5 to 2.

The strikers arrived on the Seattle battle ground in time yesterday to take a fall out of the team that has been walloping the Salt Lake team. The arrival of the players seemed to put "ginger" into the game and they walked off with the game with but little trouble. Seattle was outplayed from start to finish and never seemed to have a chance against the home crowd. The game ended with a score of 5 to 2.

Quick pitched for Salt Lake and gave a fine exhibition of twirling. For eight innings he allowed the enemy only one hit, but in the ninth they managed to get in five clean ones. After one man had scored, the batting attack was brought to a termination by a pretty double play by the West, Donahue, Davis, row.

Salt Lake did some nice strike work. With two men on bases, Shea gave a nice two-bagger. At another time when runs were needed, Quick got one safe for two bags. One of the features of the game was Flannery's catch of a low swift one batted by Stanley, cutting off two runs. The summary follows:

## STALEY BROKE TRACK RECORD

His Motor Did. Some Very Fast Work at Saucer Last Night

## REDMAN BROTHERS AGAIN.

By Good Head Work They Carried Off Another Five Mile Tandem Event—Long Walks.

The races at the Salt Palace last evening were a long time getting started, but some of the events were very fast and interesting, and the meet was voted a success. The features of the evening were the running of Staley's single motor, formerly owned by George Maxwell of Denver, and the Redman brothers riding in the five-mile tandem amateur.

In the five-mile open motor race, the record of the track for this year was broken by Staley. The best time for the mile made this year until last evening was 1:27. Staley circled the track eight times in the remarkable time of 1:23.5. The five-miles were covered in the rapid time of 7:34.5.

The race was between Staley and the Hopper machine, manipulated by "Baldy" Staver and Iver Redman. It was one of the most even races ever seen at the saucer. For the greater part of the time, the two machines raced neck and neck, but Staley had a slight lead all the time and did not take any chances. Six motors were supposed to enter but only four actually came down to the two mentioned.

The five-mile amateur tandem caused was made in 11. During the first mile Lamber and Agass had to fall out owing to a puncture, leaving only three tandems on the track. The Redman brothers also fell out, the other team, the Staley brothers, pleased until it came time for the final sprint, when they rushed to the front and won first money. The summary follows: Five-mile open professional—Staley, first; Downing, second; Hoffman, third. Time, 7:34.5.

## KEEFE'S SCHEME FAILED.

Tricked to Go Against Britt, Ten Pounds Heavier.

San Francisco, July 31.—Of the many tricks that fighters have perpetrated on the San Francisco public, none was more successful than that of the O'Keefe crowd in their endeavor to secure the crowd and the long end of the purse in the fight between O'Keefe and Britt. The fight was scheduled to take place at the Mechanics pavilion tonight. O'Keefe's plan was simply to trick the crowd into the California champion many pounds over weight.

He was willing to forfeit his weight money in order to get into the ring with Britt and by sheer weight and the added weight of 10 pounds of flesh to wear the California champion eventually knock him out or secure the decision through the award of the referee. But O'Keefe's scheme failed. He was outwitted without hearing from Britt and his manager and when the weighing in machine took place this evening second, O'Keefe was so much over weight that Britt refused to go on with the Chicagoan. In his disappointment, Britt was the support of all fair-minded sportsmen.

## EVENTS AT CLEVELAND.

In Spite of Breeze, Lou Dillon Broke Her Record.

Cleveland, O., July 31.—In spite of a heavy breeze that blew down the home stretch, Lou Dillon, owned by C. R. Billings of Chicago, and driven by Millard Sanders, succeeded in breaking her record this afternoon at the Glenview track. She did not break the world's record for trotters, 2:23.4, held by Ceresus for two years, was due entirely to the wind, as she was in the three-quarters pole in 1:32.1. But for the wind she would have made the last quarter in 29 seconds. As it was, she made it in 28.2 seconds, the time for her mile being 2:23.4, better than her own previous time by three-quarters of a second and beating the world's time of 2:23.4. Bert Nelson Makes His First Ascention At Calder's Park.

Bert Nelson, who was born and has grown up in Salt Lake, made a balloon ascention yesterday at Calder's park and took a parachute drop in fine style, although he had never before been "up in a balloon" in his life.

Prof. Abbott, who has been making the ascentions at the park was with him yesterday and unable to make the trip. Young Nelson, who has been very much interested in the ascentions, has watched them closely, volunteered to go and Prof. Abbott consented.

Everybody was surprised when Nelson appeared in the regulation uniform to make the trip. He did it in fine style and without a hitch.

"I wasn't frightened at all," he said in afterwards talking about it. "I was sure I could do it, and although I felt a little queer the sensation was not unpleasant. Like everyone else, when the balloon started it seemed to me as though it was stationary and that the earth was receding from me. I went up about 3,000 feet and then dropped in the parachute, which fell, as I should judge, about 200 feet before it opened. After that everything was fine and I went down easy. I want to make more ascentions."

About 700 members of the Swedish Brotherhood of America were present and their families and friends saw the ascention.

The last smallpox patient in the old quarantine hospital at the mouth of Parley's canyon was discharged yesterday, and for the second time since the building was pressed into service as a quarantine hospital, which was four years ago, it is now without a single patient. The hospital, which has never been used for smallpox patients, is now being converted into a hospital for the old hospital, for next week its contents will be fumigated and removed to the new and modern one, which is just being completed near the mouth of Emigration canyon.

The health authorities now believe that smallpox will be completely stamped out in the city and there are at present only five small cases and they are so closely quarantined that there is no likelihood of the disease spreading further.

## OGDEN POSTOFFICE SITE.

Warrant for One Dollar in Payment Therefor Sent From Washington.

A warrant for \$1 was drawn yesterday, by the treasury department at Washington, with all the care and precaution that might have attended the drawing of a warrant for \$100,000. It was to pay for the site to the proposed Ogden postoffice building; and owing to the peculiar circumstances attending the donation of the land, it was considered advisable to make the warrant payable to "Abel Leonard, formerly bishop of the Protestant Episcopal church for Nevada and Utah, now the bishop of the same church of the missionary district of Salt Lake county, State of Utah, and the church of the Good Shepherd, a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Utah, and to Flora T. Leonard."

The warrant was sent to the department of justice, which will forward it to United States Dist. Atty. Lippincott with instructions to turn it over to the payee early after establishing the fact that nothing affecting the title to the land has been done since the papers were forwarded here.

Supervising Architect Taylor will make plans for the Ogden postoffice building late this fall, so that they will be ready early next year.
