IRRIGATORS AT OUT.

A complaint has been filed in the Second district court by John T. Thompson, Andrew J. Hunt, George R. Bennett, Joseph W. Arave, Frank Arave, Archibald and William Sorenson, as trustees of the Hooper Irrigation company, against Archibald and James H. Jensen, directors of the West Weber Irrigation company.

The complaint sets forth the rights and titles of the Hooper Irrigation company to certain waters in Weber river, dating back as far as 1872, that on about August 28 or 29, 1898, the defendants did direct and use the waters of the said plaintiffs, that they did unlawfully wilfully and without right, break and damage the locks of plaintiff which were used on headgates and dam off the waters from its regular course, and threaten to still continue to appropriate the waters of the plaintiffs, greatly to the injury of the irrigators of said Hooper district, whereupon the plaintiffs ask that a temporary injunction be served on the defendants to restrain them in court that a permanent injunction be made and for damages and costs of suit.

The temporary injunction was signed by Judge Rolapp yesterday and served on the defendants by Deputy Sheriff Bailey.
