In commenting upon the tariff bill, Mr. Aldrich said it was not his porpose to discuss the wisdom or unwisdom of the protective tariff policy. He sided that there would be no attempt to restrict sebate on the Democratic side upon the question.

Several items, he said, had been reported practically without recommendating—cost and its reciprocal provision, print paper and wond pulp and hides. He said that this had not been done because of any desire to evade responsibility on those questions, but marely because the committee had not received data that would permit it to draw its conclusions. When that data was received, he said, recommendations would be made in respect to those items.

Mr. Aldrich said he would reply to the senator's suggestion that the tariff schedules be reduced to offset the \$50,000,000 to be raised by an income tax. The documents found confirmed the opinion previously entertained at the consulate that Mr. Bainbridge had briken down from overwork; that he was temporarily insane, and that he took his life while suffering from the mania of persecution.


