WONDERFUL TREES .- Two remarkable trees of Central Africa have been described by the Spanish traveler Abargues de Sosten. One of these, the acacia mimosa, grows luxuriantly in the mountainous regions, sending out its branches from the ground, much in the same way as the ribs of an umbrella when extended spread out from the handle. To complete/its resemblance to an umbrella of gigantic size the scanty leaves at the top are closely interwoven and the whole forms a na tural protection from the sun's rays of no mean importance to the weary explorer as he seeks / rest in the heat of the day. Many animals, no doubt, also avail themselves of its grateful shelter. Its height is about ten feet. The other tree is still more curlons. Its scienti-tic name is Baobab dima. This tree has a huge smooth, dark brown trunk, hollow in the centre. Into this cavity it absoabs during the rainy season, a store of water sufficient to last for

months. In short, it seems to be a kind of a cistorn tree. The branches are thick, short and bent luward. Few leaves are produced and these are soon dried up and falling off, the branches look gaunt enough.-...Santa Barbara
