Returned Missionary.—Elder N. Nelson, of American Fork, who returned on Sunday evening from a mission to the State of Iowa and Nebraska, arrived at a hotel in this city to-day. He left his home on the 7th day of last May, and during the time of his absence preached the gospel with diligence. He found a class of people who were honest and kind-hearted, who welcomed him to their houses and supplied him with food, but who either refused to listen to the truth, or else rejected it. The particular locality in which he labored was settled by people once members of the Church, but now apostates, professing to believe in spiritualism, and other delusions, and therefore of all people the most difficult to lead back to the Truth. Having rejected the Gospel after they once beheld its glorious light, their minds have become so darkened that they cannot appreciate the true spirit or gain its possession. They wander in doubt, being drawn this way and that by every wind of doctrine. Their reply to Brother Nelson's preaching was that if they only knew that the Gospel was true, they would embrace it and hasten to the mountains. But, failing to exercise that faith necessary for enlightenment, could not be converted. Rates of Domestic Postage.
LETTERS.—The standard single rate is 5 cents per 100 words. Registered letters, 10 cents per 100 words. Newspapers, 1 cent per copy. Periodicals, 1 cent per copy. Packages, 1 cent per pound. The maximum weight of any package of printed or miscellaneous matter is 10 pounds.

Registered Letters and Money Orders.
LETTERS.—Letters may be registered on payment of a fee of ten cents. In addition to the regular postage, the government takes no compensation for safe carriage or for insurance in case of loss.

Money Orders.—Money orders may be issued in United States currency, payable to order of any person, and are subject to the same laws as other money orders. The maximum amount of any money order is \$100.00. On orders not exceeding \$10.00, 10 cents. On orders not exceeding \$20.00, 20 cents. On orders not exceeding \$50.00, 50 cents. On orders not exceeding \$100.00, 100 cents.

Money Orders.—All principal post offices now receive small sums of money and send them by the same route as other money orders, subject to the following rates: On orders not exceeding \$10.00, 10 cents. On orders not exceeding \$20.00, 20 cents. On orders not exceeding \$50.00, 50 cents. On orders not exceeding \$100.00, 100 cents.
