The question now to be considered is baptism for the dead. Not much of ancient record has come down to us relating to this ordinance of the gospe It is likely that owing to the scattered condition of the churches in the time of the apostles that baptisms for the of the apostles that baptisms for the dead were only occasionally performed. But that this ordinance was performed by the saints of that day is evident from what Paul says of it. Possibly also this ordinance was attended to ju Solomen's temple, for we read of the "molten sea," or baptismal font, that was erected therein. (See I Kings: vii 25)

Paul when speaking to the Corinth-Paul when speaking to the Corinth-ian saints on the subject of the resur-rection, alluded to this ordinance, us-ing it as an argument to prove the resurrection. They wrist have been familiar with it, else he would not have referred to it. He says: 3 Corinthians, 15: 29—Else what shall they do, which are baptized for the dead, if the dead rise not at all? Why are they then baptized for the dead? But to Joseph Smith, the great
