Presidents Young, Kimball and others returned to Winter Quarters late in the fall of 1847, and in the next spring Br. Kimball started with his family for these valleys. Sr. Vilate had a wagon fitted up for her, drawn by two span of bay horses. In this wagon she traveled from Winter Quarters to this valley; and she occupied it as her bedroom for four years.

On the journey, and for a time after her arrival here, she had much trouble through the sickness of her daughter fant child, while traveling by the Sweetwater River, and the hardships endured through exposure in cold and stormy weather, while in a most delicate condition of health.

They arrived here in the fall of 1848, and she still continued in her wagon until Br. Kimball built his present abode, in which she resided until her death. She was the mother of ten children, eight boys and two girls, six of whom still live; and the grandmother of thirty
