

furiously from the east. Thus aided, the fire-kings marched victoriously from east to west, and took possession of more than four hundred acres of ground. He made a meal of four hundred streets and lanes, thirteen thousand houses, and gormandized over from ten to fifteen millions of private property. His course was only arrested when the wind abated, and an immense gap was made by blowing up the buildings in the path of the flames.

CONSTANTINOPLE.—A prominent place belongs to the city of the Sultan among the list of fire-doomed cities. There was a conflagration in 1729, which consumed twelve thousand houses and seven thousand persons; at another, in 1745, six thousand lives were lost. Other destructive fires occurred in 1771 and 1786; while another in 1791 destroyed thirty thousand dwellings and nearly eight thousand people.

COPENHAGEN.—Has suffered greatly from fire. It was three times burnt almost to the ground, and during the bombardment of 1807 a fire broke out by which four thousand lives were lost. Indeed, at the present day there is not more than a dozen ancient houses in the Danish capital.

QUEBEC.—Has suffered severely from fire; and, at the last extensive conflagration there, two thirds of the city was destroyed.

PUNISHMENT FOR STINGINESS.—A singular custom prevails in some parts of Bavaria, and was re-enacted only a short time since. When a person in a community is notoriously stingy, or renders himself obnoxious to his fellow townsmen, they gather about his house, drag him forth and hold a sort of mock trial "under the authority of Charlemagne," recite in verse the charges against him, while after each verse the assembly break into taunting laughter, and make a fearful noise with pans, bells, trumpets, whip cracking, shouts and stamping. At the end the culprit has another admonition; and other sinners are warned that if they do not improve, the next meeting will be held at their houses. With this the gathering separates as mysteriously as it came together.

METHODISM IN MISSOURI.—That devoted patriot, the Rev. Dr. Elliot, in referring to Methodism in Missouri, says:

"We have to say, Your God reigneth in Missouri. This State is now ravaged, as she attempted to ravage Kansas, and thus establish oppression in Kansas in view of continuing it in Missouri. In the fifteen months of your persecution, since the death of Bewley—our Stephen—one-third of the slaves of Missouri have been taken from the State, by flight or otherwise. Kansas is free. The power of slavery and of persecution is broken in Missouri. The State is in the Union, and will remain there. Bishop Simpson, in a few days from now, (December 20th) will commence the work of reconstruction of the M. E. Church in Missouri."

NOTES.
Proposals must be to carry the mail with "celerity, certainty, and security;" using the terms of the law, and they must be guaranteed by two responsible persons, certified to as such by a postmaster or judge of a court of record.

No pay will be made for trips not performed, and for each of such omissions not satisfactory is explained three times the pay of the trip may be deducted. For arrivals so far behind time as to break connexion with depending mails, and not sufficiently excused, one fourth of the compensation for the trip is subject to forfeiture. Fines will be imposed, unless the delinquency be satisfactorily explained, for neglecting to take the mail from or into a post office; for suffering it to be injured, delayed, robbed, or lost; and for refusing, after demand, to convey the mail as frequently as the contractor runs, or is concerned in running vehicles on the route. The Postmaster General may annul the contract for violation of the post office laws, or for disobedience of the instructions of the department. He may alter the schedule, and also order an increase of service by allowing therefor a pro rata increase on the contract pay. He may also curtail or discontinue the service in whole or in part, at pro rata decrease of pay, allowing one month's extra compensation on the amount of service dispensed with.
