

We are requested to publish the following facts regarding the grand picnic tendered to the veteran army who are coming to the city, for the government of those who are to assist in making the occasion successful.

The ladies of the Relief Societies in each ward are expected to provide the picnic, knives, plates, etc., for the old folks of their own wards, and all who may be temporarily stopping in their respective wards, for the grand dinner for all those who are seventy years old and upward, to be given in Liberty Park.

The grove around the stand will be divided off and labeled with the number of the ward, and is entitled to use it, where all the members of that ward may gather and join in the social enjoyment of the day.

It is requested that all persons owning teams, carriages, etc., will assist the committee in conveying visitors to the homes assigned them in the different wards, on the arrival of the trains from the north, south and west, next Monday and Tuesday. It is distinctly to be understood that only persons 70 years old and upward are entitled to the courtesy of the committee, and that those of less age, therefore, need not feel alarmed if they are not of that age, as the number of persons likely to be present will not be far short of 1,000 who are 70 years old.

The committee will furnish hot water for the grand dinner at the grounds for the use of the societies for that purpose only, but cannot undertake to provide water for everybody for picnic purposes.

They desire to state that the duty of making glad the hearts of our grand old folks is one of the most important of all, and that no act of their life will be more creditable to them than the one of paying respect to advanced age.

It is reported that numbers of visitors to whom free passes have been given may come in on Monday. All should be here on Tuesday, as the committee cannot attend in person on Wednesday at the cars to look after the disposition of visitors during the festival at the Tabernacle, Theatre and Liberty Park.

All persons of seventy years and upward to eighty will wear a red bow on their left breast. Those of eighty and up to 90, a blue one, and from ninety to one hundred, a white one. They will be the guests of Salt Lake City during their stay, and every courtesy possible should be extended to them by all persons.

At the Tabernacle, next Wednesday, the invited guests will occupy the centre seats. No person under seventy years of age will be permitted to sit there.

There are yet 200 persons for whom homes must be found during their stay here, and it is earnestly requested that the persons who can accommodate one, two or more of them will send their names immediately to C. R. Savage, or Geo. Goddard at the Tithing Office, so that they may be sent to them on their arrival. State if you prefer man and wife, or male, or female, if single, or any other particulars.

Our arrangements are nearly perfected, except providing homes, and it will relieve us of this last anxiety if the citizens will rally at once and help us.

THE TREAT FOR THE OLD FOLKS. PREPARATIONS FOR A FINE TIME.

A delightful programme is being prepared by the committee for the Old Folks. The grand concert will open at 10 o'clock a.m. in the Tabernacle, next Wednesday. We are enabled to give a forecast of the proceedings.

The American Fork brass band will play a selection, and the Tabernacle choir sing "Coronation," when prayer will be offered by Apostle W. Woodruff.

The scenes of by-gone times will be brought to the minds of the veterans by the performance of "Auld Lang Syne," by Croxall's silver band. An address of welcome will be delivered by Mayor Jennings.

Musical by the Ogden brass band; address by President John Taylor; song, "The Lord God Omnipotent Reigneth," dedicated to President Taylor, Miss Laura Nebeker, Mrs. E. S. Grow and Messrs. W. H. Foster and Joseph Morgan; "Old Folks at Home," by Croxall's silver band; address by Bishop Edward Hunter; song, Mrs. Careless.

Organ solo, Prof. J. J. Daynes; address, President Angus M. Cannon; song, "My Old Wife and I," W. C. Dunbar.

At this point the veterans will each be presented with a bouquet of flowers from the hands of the juveniles of the Primary Associations.

The Tabernacle choir will sing "Jerusalem, My Glorious Home," which will be followed by an air by the Ogden brass band.

On the afternoon of the same day (Wednesday) at 3 o'clock, the Old Folks will attend a free performance of "Queen's Evidence," at the Theatre, by the Home Dramatic Club, who generously tender their services gratuitously for the occasion. President Taylor also gives the free use of the house.

On the following day (Thursday) there will be a gala time at Liberty Park. The party will assemble at 10 a.m., when there will be music and other exercises, including general instructions from the committee. At noon the guests who have passed the threshold of seventy will sit down to a sumptuous banquet provided by the ladies of Salt Lake City.

The terminal portion of the day's proceedings will consist of a variety of exercises by the "old folks," including foot races and other competitive games, the successful in which will be awarded suitable prizes.

Altogether the affair promises, besides its novelty, to be one of the finest treats ever given to the old folks of any community.

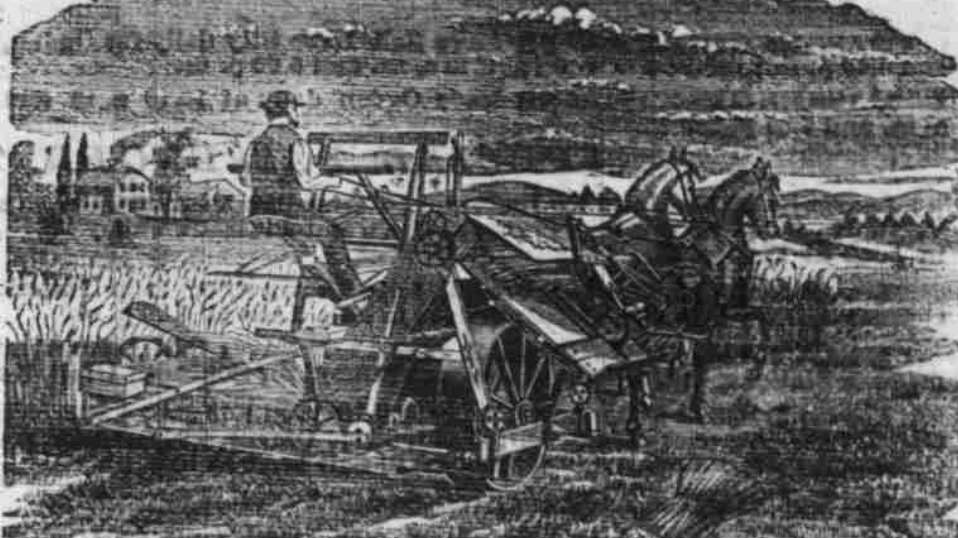
