EMBALMING.

The embalming will be completed to-day. The cheeks and face, by the process made use of, have been made to assume a fullness, and the deeper fur-rows and lines have been filled out and the expression of the face is now one of peace and rest. On Monday the remains will be placed in a casket and the near triends will be permitted to view them. Senor Romero is with the family to-riny, as are also Dr. Newman and his wife.
