

STATISTICS OF THE REIGN OF TERROR.

A recent number of the *Monde*, gives the following statistics of the "Reign of Terror" in France.

"The French revolution, which certain writers have set themselves the task of justifying, was not, as they say, the work of the people, who suffered as much or even more than the wealthy, for the odious excess for which efforts are now made to render them responsible. The following statistics are eloquent on the point.

"Nobles executed, 1,575; women of the same class, 750; together, 2,325; Nuns, 350; priests, 1,135; together, 2,485; Females of the laboring classes, 1,457; commoners of all conditions, 15,833; together, 15,100. Women of the people killed in La Vendee, 16,000; children, 22,000; together, 37,000. At Nantes the number of carrier's victims was 38,000, of whom the nobles and clergy formed only a small proportion—namely, nobles drowned, 1,400; priests shot, 300; drowned, 480. In recapitulation we find: commoners of working classes, 52,000; priests and nobles, 6,678."

THE FARM.

Farming is a profession, not to say a science. If any one doubts this statement let him leave his city home for no one bred in the country will doubt it—and undertake to cultivate even a garden of half an acre for the summer. He will then find that knowledge is as essential to the right use of the spade as the pen, and there is a great difference between the scientific farming of England, where literally not a weed is to be seen, and that of many of our farmers, the wealth of whose soil is about equally divided between fruit and weeds, as between the trades of a modern commercial city and the barter of the backwoods settlement. It is true that agriculture has been the last to receive the impetus of modern science. It is true that many agriculturists are content to go in the ways of their fathers, because experience is costly. But it is also true that they are unable to compete with those who understand the new instruments, methods and fertilizers. Agriculture is also becoming in this country a popular recreation. Many a gentleman is content to spend on his country seat money which he makes in the countingroom. The practical farmer is thus able to get the benefit of experiments without paying for them. This change in Agriculture, which has converted it from drudgery to an art, has created a demand for a corresponding literature. Fifty years ago, a stable agricultural periodical did not exist on the American Continent. Now, every considerable district has one, while almost every weekly paper, secular or religious, has its agricultural department; and it will not be long before something of a library will be a part of every well-ordered farm. — *Harper's Magazine*.

RELIGIOUS CONDITION OF ENGLISH TOWNS.—A fearful description of the moral and religious condition of the large towns of England was given at the Church Congress now in session at Liverpool. In 751 towns in the kingdom, there are about twelve millions of people, and some of the parishes contain a population of twenty-seven thousand souls. Many of these large parishes are "moral deserts, far less hopeful than similar districts in Kaffraria or New Zealand." They are surrounded by none but the feeblest influences for good. "Public opinion in these little worlds was rarely on the side of virtue and religion," there was much skepticism and theoretical heresy among them; "but the most of them were not intellectual enough for that; their minds were kept under a continual strain for the supply of their daily wants; they ate, drank and slept like the unreasoning quadrupeds, and passed to their great account with as little thought as the beasts that perish."

A WONDERFUL STORY.—It is said that in the tombs of the Necropolis of Ancient Egypt, two kinds of mummies have been found. One is incomplete—that is to say, all organs necessary to life have been separated from them; the other, on the contrary, is quite complete. Having observed this, a Swedish chemist, Dr. Grunselbach, who has the reputation of being both great and fearless, Professor of the University of Uppsala, has come to the conclusion that the Egyptian mummies are not all, as has been said and believed for some thousands of years, bodies embalmed by any process of preservation whatever, but that they are really the bodies of individuals whose life has been momentarily suspended, with the intention of restoring them at some future time, only the secret of preservation has been lost. Meanwhile Professor Grunselbach adduces many proofs in support of his idea; among others, his experiments during the last ten years, which he says, have always proved successful. He took a snake, and treated it in such a manner as to render it as though it had been carved in marble, and it was as brittle, that he had allowed it to fall, it would have broken into fragments. In this state he kept it for one or several years, then restored it to life by sprinkling it with a stimulating fluid, the composition of which is his secret. For fifteen years the snake has been undergoing an existence composed of successive deaths and resurrections, apparently without sustaining any harm. The Professor is reported to have sent a petition to his Government, requesting that a criminal who has been condemned to death may be given to him, to break in the same manner as the snake, promising to restore him to life in two years. It is understood that the man who undergoes the experiment is to be pardoned. Whether the Swedish government has accepted or rejected the learned chemist's proposal is not known. — *English Paper*.
