TRAGIC DEATH OF THOMAS BURNETT.

One of Eden's Most Estimable Young Men Killed in a Runaway.

ANOTHER \$75,000 DAMAGE SUIT.

General of Thomas L. Cunningham—Criminal Cases in Municipal Court—April Weddings.

A sad accident occurred at Eden, Weber county, Tuesday afternoon which resulted in the death of one of that town's most estimable young men, Thomas Burnett. The young man had been riding away from the intention of driving away when the horses became frightened and dashed down the street at a rapid speed. In their wild run they went down a steep hill, the wagon overturned throwing Mr. Burnett a considerable distance crushing him against a large stone, crushing seven of his ribs, one of them piercing his lung causing internal hemorrhage. A physician was summoned from Ogden and made a quick drive to Eden but could only administer opiates to ease the terrible pain and in the evening, the young man died at 5:30 in the evening. The funeral services over his remains were held at the Eden meetinghouse at 2 o'clock. The committee on streets and avenues was instructed and given power to buy the necessary land and open streets between the Z. C. M. I., and David Coulbears, and also the street crossing the river at Alex Sims' home. It was decided to sell the city land on the west side and what is known as the city park.

The Southern Pacific company is being all kinds of damage suits filed against it for death of its employees. During the past two weeks suits have been filed and are being prepared to against the company to recover nearly \$100,000 alleged to be due for death and injury to its employees.

A suit is being prepared by Henderson & MacMillan as attorneys for J. J. Harris, administrator of the estate of William L. Haller another victim of the Jackson station explosion, to recover \$100,000 damages alleged to be due the death of Haller. The complaint filed in the circuit court at Salt Lake City and will recite that Haller was employed as messenger in the baggage department at Jackson station, Feb. 27, when the explosion occurred which caused the death of Haller. The deceased had wife and four children residing in Idaho.

Funeral services over the remains of the fifth ward meetinghouse yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock. They were largely attended by sympathizing friends who gathered to pay their respects to the memory of the young man who was called so suddenly from earthly life. Many words of comfort and aid of the young man's usefulness were spoken by Patriarch George W. Smith, Bishop John Watson and several other prominent men of the ward. The funeral tributes were numerous and beautiful. Interment was in the city cemetery.

CRIMINAL CASES IN MUNICIPAL COURT.

John Quinn, one of the alleged Zang hoodlums, was brought before Judge Holt to answer to the charge. He waived preliminary examination and was bound over to answer to the charge in the district court under \$10,000 in default of which he was turned over to the custody of the sheriff.

The preliminary hearing of Fred Smith, charged by Mrs. Mattie Smith with having carnal knowledge of her daughter who is under 18 years of age, was commenced. The testimony of witnesses was taken and then the case was continued for one week.

MISSIONARY FAREWELL.

Elder Bernard Newren Given a Handsome Parting by His Friends.

Scotfield, Carbon Co., April 12.—A farewell party was given in Scotfield meetinghouse April 11, in honor of Elder Bernard Newren, who is about to leave for Europe on a mission. The party was a most enjoyable one and a grand success, attended by the largest crowd that has been in this ward since the explosion in 1900. A fine program was rendered, followed by refreshments and dancing. Elder Newren was presented with a purse of \$125. He left this morning for Salt Lake City, and on Wednesday he leaves for the east.

President F. M. Lyman had been acquainted with President Hinckley about 35 years, and he was a man the speaker had been very much interested in and had greatly admired. In looking over the family of the departed he saw a condition that was rare in such

large family. That every son bids fair to become his father's equal. They could not expect to excel him in devotion to the work, but they might become his equals, and they had enjoyed better advantages in life than their father. His daughters, also, the speaker believed, were devoted to the principles which their father was devoted through life.

Elder Hinckley had lived a very worthy life, and had been abundantly rewarded, and the family with which he had been blessed would cause him great honor. Neither he nor the mothers of his children would ever have cause to blush for the actions of their children.

A large number read from the Seventy-sixth section of the Doctrine and Covenants, commencing with the 50th verse. He had no doubt that President Ira N. Hinckley had earned the right to be numbered with the class of which he had been numbered. Bishop Partridge, in behalf of the family, thanked those who had assisted during the illness and since the death of Elder Hinckley. The choir sang "O My Father," etc. Benediction was offered by Elder J. L. Robinson.

PREST. HINCKLEY LAID TO REST.

Impressive Services in Provo Tabernacle Over Remains of Faithful Veteran.

BEAUTIFUL LIFE EULOGIZED.

Addresses by President Francis M. Lyman and Other Long-Time Associates.

Provo, Utah, Co. April 14.—Funeral services over the remains of President Ira N. Hinckley were held yesterday afternoon in the Tabernacle, attended by a large congregation of relatives and friends. The Brigham Young university, with which two of his sons have been connected as instructors, closed during the services in order to give the faculty and students an opportunity to attend. There were also present many friends from other parts of the state.

The speakers' stand was beautifully draped in white and ornamented with vines and flowers, on it were seated President Francis M. Lyman of the Apostles' quorum, Patriarch John

Smith, President Seymour B. Young, Presidents John and Keeler of the state presidency, President George H. Brigham, Patriarch Joseph D. Smith of Fillmore, Prof. J. E. Hickman and other members of the local priesthood.

Bishop Partridge of the Fifth ward presided over the services, which were opened by the University choir singing "I need Thee every hour," etc.

Prayer was offered by President Joseph B. Keeler.

The choir sang, "Thou dost not weep to weep alone," etc.

Elder J. E. Hickman read a beautiful eulogy of the departed, containing biographical data.

President George H. Brigham was the first speaker. He expressed himself as feeling the death of Patriarch Hinckley as a personal loss, he having been a near neighbor of the speaker since his residence in Provo, with whom Elder Brigham had looked forward with fond anticipation to years of association. He spoke of the noble qualities of the deceased, as a father and a friend and of the straight and honorable course of Elder Hinckley throughout life. He had died a good man and in order to do so it was necessary to have lived a good life.

Patriarch John Smith endorsed the eulogium that had been said of Brother Hinckley. He had been a good man, a father and a friend to all who knew him.

Elder Seymour B. Young said he had been acquainted with Brother Hinckley for a very long time, and he was a man whose speaker had always delighted to meet. He spoke of the services of Elder Hinckley while with the "Y. C. E." in 1857 and later in 1864. Brother Hinckley was always earnest and sincere in the performance of duty. He was a good soldier and a good citizen. The speaker then spoke of the long and faithful career of President Hinckley as president of the Millard stake, where he labored earnestly and with love as a faithful kindness for the advancement of the people and the purposes of the Lord. He had gone, the speaker said, to the reward of a man who had never betrayed a trust, never betrayed his brethren and never betrayed his God. He was a good soldier and a good citizen. 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
