

POULTRY EXHIBIT COMES NEXT WEEK

Entries for Competition Closes
Today and Show Begins
Wednesday.

HEIMLICH WILL ADJUDICATE

Judging of Stock Will Take Place Before Doors Are Opened to The Public.

A four days' exhibition will be conducted by the Utah State Poultry association, commencing Wednesday, Jan. 27, and closing the following Saturday. It will be the twenty-first annual show under the association's auspices, and is expected to be the largest and most interesting yet undertaken.

The judge of the occasion will be D. Heimlich, of Jacksonville, Ill., and the exhibition will be held at 62 east second south street. The adjudication will take place at the same building on Monday and Tuesday preceding the opening of the show to the public. Today the entries for competition will be received, and the secretary will be at the place indicated by 12 o'clock Monday, Jan. 25, following are the rules and regulations under which the exhibition will be conducted:

1. Entry blanks may be obtained from C. J. Sander, secretary, 335 Seventh East, or from Vogeler & Co., 50 west First South street, Salt Lake City.

2. All entries for competition must be in the hands of the secretary not later than Friday, Jan. 22, 1909, and all birds entered for competition must be in the show room by 12 o'clock Monday, Jan. 25, 1909.

3. All specimens intended for exhibition and competition shall be under the control of the secretary and can not be removed except with his consent.

4. The secretary will receive no birds for entry unless accompanied by the exhibitor. The exhibitor need not accompany his birds, but may ship them to secretary Utah State Poultry association, who shall have exclusive charge of the birds during the exhibition, and that they are properly cared for and returned to their owners after the exhibition.

5. The entry fee shall be 50 cents per fowl for non-members, 25 cents per fowl for members. The exhibitor need not accompany his birds, but may ship them to secretary Utah State Poultry association, who shall have exclusive charge of the birds during the exhibition, and that they are properly cared for and returned to their owners after the exhibition.

6. The Smith Sealed leg band shall be used on each bird entered. They may be purchased from the secretary for 1 cent each. All birds banded by the association will cost owner 5 cents each.

7. Standard exhibition rooms must be furnished by the exhibitor or rented from the secretary not later than Saturday, Jan. 22, 1909. Standard size, 24 inches deep and 36 inches high. Rent of rooms, 25 cents each.

8. All disputes arising will be settled by the executive committee. The committee also reserves the right to distribute all special prizes that remain unclaimed.

9. No exhibitor will be allowed under any circumstances to handle any birds except his own. Any infringement on this rule will deprive the exhibitor of all prizes and forfeit all birds entered that may have been awarded to them.

10. Birds competing as a pen can also compete as single birds; the best male and four best females shall constitute the best pen in each variety shall be awarded first premium.

11. Bantams will be barred from competition in all special and sweepstake classes.

12. Subscription agencies shall be charged \$5 for privilege of show room.

13. Price for space for incubators and brooders and other displays given upon application to secretary.

14. The hall will be open to receive specimens from 10 a. m. to 7 p. m. Jan. 24 and from 8 a. m. to 12 noon, Jan. 25. Birds must reach the show room on time as the show will be closed and weighed ready for the judges to begin their work Monday noon. The hall will be open to the public Wednesday morning.

15. Admission to the exhibition will be as follows: Adults, 25 cents; children 10 cents.

16. Birds may be removed at any time after 6 p. m. Saturday, Jan. 23, 1909.

INVITE PRESIDENT TAFT

He Will Be Urged to Be Present at the Convention of the Grand Army.

The work of preparing for the Grand Army encampment is now beginning on a definite basis. At the meeting of the general executive committee held yesterday afternoon a sub-committee was appointed to see the proprietors of hotels and secure from each a contract to the effect that normal rates would prevail in their hotels for rooms during the encampment, except that where more than one person occupies a room the usual rate will be charged each person.

Another thing decided upon in the meeting was to send to President William Howard Taft an invitation to be present at the encampment. A beautifully engraved invitation was decided upon as the proper way to express the wishes of the people, and it will be forwarded as soon as drawn up.

For the women working on committees in charge of certain portions of the encampment a first appropriation was decided upon rather than to have each bill submitted for general audit. This action was taken so that the women might be given free transportation to their work. Master Bradford, chairman of the committee, called it to order and presided at the meeting.

BIG WOOL CLIP SOLD.

Mark Harris Declares He Has Bought 3,000,000 Pounds.

Mark Harris of St. Louis announced last evening on his return to this city of his purchase of the entire clip of the Mountain Green Woolgrowers' association, amounting to 3,000,000 pounds, the product of 30 growers, at 15 cents. Mr. Harris returned to St. Louis today, having contracted for 3,000,000 pounds of Utah and western Idaho wool. He claims he is not fighting the Chicago storage plan, but merely to look after the interests of his house. In fact, he considers the Chicago movement a good thing, and would hereafter probably find it to his interest to buy from the Chicago warehouse.

Mr. Harris says there is less than 30 per cent of the Utah clip yet unsold.

POEM AND SONG RECITAL

Mrs. Carrie Jacobs-Bond Is Heard at Ladies' Literary Club.

One of the most delightful entertainments ever given at the Ladies' Literary Club took place last night, when Mrs. Carrie Jacobs-Bond gave a recital in original poem and song. She was introduced by Mrs. Martha Royce King in a series of happy remarks. She told of her first acquaintance with the noted author's work. "Several years ago," said Mrs. King, "I came across a group of songs, so remarkable in depth of sentiment that I devoted myself to their study, wondering all the time what power resided in their author to awaken so profound an impression upon their listeners' hearts. Later it was my good fortune to meet the author and composer, and my acquaintance soon proved to be a great blessing and a source of a great deal of pleasure."

It is in this quality in their compositions which will make the exquisite pleasure live forever."

Mrs. Bond replied to this introduction with the deprecating remark that she was only a means to the persons, not her songs the power which Mrs. King had described. Her work, she said, was along the simplest lines. They expressed the common, every-day sentiments of humanity, and had laid claim to pose as classics. She believed that while a gifted few were lifted into the high realm of music, there still existed a large majority to whom the simple life-songs were dear, and with this she was content. "I am glad," she said, "that you have found in my melodies some good fortune to meet some of the great emotions of classic song. Madame Schumann-Heink, and others who after hearing her songs, placed some of them on their concert programs. This had helped to bring them into notice and since then, her efforts had been to make her songs more popular."

Mrs. Bond then read extracts from a narrative poem in homely dialect containing a rare story of a girl with charming bits of melody which captivated the hearts of all. Her songs numbering over two dozen for the most part number no more than two stanzas and many are only four lines, and are what the author calls "encore songs." There are songs pathetic and so humorous, and a little group of negro melody aptly called by the author "songs of all showing the wonderful diversity of theme and shading and all immensely appealing. In beginning Mrs. Bond sang a song which she claimed to be neither a vocalist nor an elocutionist, yet both her recital and singing showed the appreciative dramatic quality which permeates her work. Added to this was a most charming personality which made the enjoyment of her audience complete.

Mrs. Bond in a few moments after talk said that she had come almost from the jaws of a hospital to fulfill her engagement in Salt Lake. The doctors, indeed, had told her that she must keep the trip, but rather than break her engagement, she had taken the risk. Added up to the moment of her song-writing Mrs. Bond replied that it had been necessary as well as the intellectual and emotional expression of her work about 15 years ago, and has a notable list of achievements in her special line to show for her efforts. Mrs. Bond's home is in Chicago. During her stay here she is the guest of Mrs. Martha Royce King, who entertains her at an informal reception for the gifted composer.

SHROEDER LANGUISHES IN THE COUNTY JAIL

He Is to Be Charged With Impersonating a Government Officer To Defraud.

C. L. Shroeder is in the county jail, awaiting a hearing before United States Commissioner Baldwin on a charge of impersonating a government official and swindling. He was brought from Provo yesterday by Marshal L. H. Smyth. His operations had not been confined to Utah county, but other counties had been visited by him under pretense of being a government inspector, a veterinary surgeon, etc., whose duty it was to look after the sanitary condition of stock and buildings.

Shroeder claimed that he was the inventor of an effective germ killer, which, he said, had the endorsement of the department of agriculture. This he succeeded in selling in large quantities, at 50 cents per gallon. The ingredients were found to be water and a by-product of asphaltum.

Shroeder operated at Nephi, but the people there soon got on to his game, and nearly counted down his swindling. And if some towns board has \$50 to spend on having the municipality's water supply analyzed, he can surely give a glowing report, and is never too bashful to take the money.

"He is a dandy, though. If a hotel-keeper has him arrested for issuing fraudulent checks for board, he immediately starts to put up a \$40,000 hotel to get even as a competitor. At present he is wearing a silver medal or star, which was pinned on by President Roosevelt, but he expects soon to wear a gold one promised him by President-elect Taft, and then he is going to quit the service with high honors, etc., that is if he doesn't in the meantime fall into the hands of a United States marshal."
