CHILDREN PERISH

Distressing Occurrence on Premises of Thomas B. Child Yesterday Afternoon.

STARTED FIRE THEMSELVES.

Charred Bodies Found Soon After the Flames Were Discovered - Children Were Cousins.

A terrible tragedy occurred shortly after 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon in a buggy shed at the year of the residence of Thomas B. Child, 147 Seventh East atreet, when two little children were burned to death,

The children-they were mere babeswere Frank Child, aged four years, son of T. B. Child, a well known contractor; and Glenn Kimmerly, the twoyear-old son of Charles Kimmerly. The Intter resides at 153 Seventh East.

HOW IT HAPPENED.

The tots had been playing together and had been in the habit of using the buggy shed as a playhouse. Other children played there every day and the shed was the scene of many happy

In some manner not accounted for

the little ones got hold of some matches and went into the shed. There is a catch on the door, and when they closed it they were unable to get out. Just how long they had been in the place is not known, but a few minutes after 4 o'clock Mrs. Child discovered smoke issuing from the place and im-mediately gave an alarm. The fire de-partment was telephoned for and the apparatus from No. 4 station, and As-sistant Chief Workman hurried to the

BODIES DISCOVERED.

Mrs. Child thought of the children and ran frantically into the house, call-ing them by name. There was no an-swer. She rushed to the shed and threw the door open. Flames leaped forth and the whole interior was ablaze. forth and the whole interior was ablaze. Mrs. Child caught one glimpse of the little bodies lying on the floor. She uttered a piercing scream and fell in a faint to the ground.

Neighbors rushed to her assistance and some began tearing boards from the barn. The children were undoubtedly dead before the fire was discovered.

Upon the arrival of Chief Workman the rushed into the burning building and carried the little charred bodies out, while other firemen turned a stream of water onto the blaze.

CHILDREN WERE COUSINS,

Mrs. Kimmerly, mother of little Glenn, saw the bodies in the arms of Chief Workman. She fainted and was carried into her home. Medical attention was necessary for the unfortunate mothers. Mrs. Child and Mrs. Kimmerly are the daughters of Desk Sergeant Charles Livingstone of the police department, and the children, therefore, were consins. were cousins.

TRIED TO ESCAPE.

As stated before, the shed was used the shed, but there was plenty from for the little ones to play. It is believed that they struck a match and then dropped it into the hay. When the flames leaped up, it is evident that the children tried to escape and got as far away from the flames as possible No one heard them scream. It is be lieved that both were smothered by the smoke before the cruel flames reached their tender little bodies. The hay was burned and one side of the buggy was destroyed.

FUNERAL TOMORROW.

The bodies of the children were removed to Joseph E. Taylor's undertaking parlors. Funeral services will be held at 12:30 tomorrow at the residence of Mr. Child, 147 Seventh East.

As the bodies are burned beyond recognition, it is doubtful if the grief tracker mothers will be recognited. stricken mothers will be permitted to see them. Mrs. Child and Mrs. Kin merly are inconsolable and are on the verge of nervous prostration.
