

## TELEGRAPHIC. TRAFFIC IN SLAVES.

Hells Boys Said to be Sold and Bought in New York.

SENT OUT IN THE STREETS TO BEG.

The Italian Government Investigating a Case Recently Discovered at Turin.

New York, Feb. 13.—The police of this city have at last turned their attention to the system of human slavery practiced here and all through the United States by Italian padrones, the present activity of the police is the direct result of a story that comes from Europe. Recently at a railroad station in Turin, Italy, two Italian ladies were found suffering with cold on a cold midwinter in the shadow of a half-closed building. The station agent, upon inquiry, learned that the boys were waiting for a man who bought them of their parents at birth. One of the padrones going to take the children to United States where he is going to sell them into practical slavery. They were in the beginning by an Italian padrone, living it is said, in Sherry street, in this city, who would give them the best of care.

The purchaser of the ladies called for them at the Turin station at a late hour, and acknowledged that he had bought them to slavery in America. The ladies were taken away immediately, and the Italian government is making an investigation into the case of human flesh to a country which passed through a great war to teach the principles that slavery can exist.

The idea that young Italian girls are sold into slavery is no new thing in New York. It is a flourishing trade and, to one that has existed for many years, despite police raids whenever evidence can be gathered that will warrant arrests, no man, Italian padrone in the business is anxious to protect himself from getting into hands of the police. The man who is engaged in this business will be set to get out of the law and police the captain back on board again.

From a statement of Dinsmore's it is thought he attempted to kill himself after shooting his wife and son. After shooting, he got into his carriage, accompanied by a man named John, and drove off. On the appearance of the doctor, his face covered with blood. He then drove to the police station and gave himself up. He was taken to a prominent hospital and given treatment.

TURKISH ARmenians.  
An Oppressed People Appeals to Cleveland.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 13.—Several Armenian refugees who came today to rescue the crew of the schooner Mihai Ilosan, discovered wrecked of the Gulf early in the day. The crews of two rescue-ship stations engaged in the work of rescue, but one of the stations, after saving four men, was forced to return to the heavy seas. Half a dozen of the schooner's crew were in the rigging, and the captain, with a broken leg, was wrapped in blankets and sent in the main stream.

PALM, Feb. 1.—During the examination of Breton, Judge Meyer suspected the accuracy of the prisoner's statement, and said: "I believe you are lying."

After being subjected to an examination of this kind, Breton was returned to the Mass. prison. Chief Inspector of Police Mueller expressed a belief that Breton had just arrived from Scotland. When examined, his body was found exceptionally clean. This indicates a desire to show that he leads a quiet life.

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VILLAGEUS LEAVES.

LOUISVILLE, Feb. 13.—A William Alexander Hill, arrested in Louisville, in Florida, is being freely extorted. The local authorities threaten to destroy the burglar unless their demands are exceeded, and implies their enemies to extort money from the burglar unless he is released.

### THE DEATH OF GRAYSON.

WATERTOWN, Feb. 13.—The fall of the Hawaiian situation came out at the close of Senator Grayson's speech, when in a colloquy with Senator McMillan, a member of the Senate. The speaker, in referring to the recent election, he understood that the efforts of the President, major or diplomat, to restore the queen were at an end, and the present minister to Hawaii had no directions to pursue further diplomatic negotiations in that end.

### TRUMAN AND AMENIAN.

An Oppressed People Appeals to Cleveland.

CONSTANCE, Feb. 13.—Some of the most notable Armenians of America, Asst. Prof. Putney, have earnestly requested the American consul there to inform President Cleveland of the condition of the Armenians. They have written to the consul, enclosing a statement of a number of important documents and that includes among the names of a doctor educated in the United States, who is falsely accused of sedition.

Turks killed 125 Armenians and wounded 300 during the recent riots at Yungat.
